Feathers From the Pigeon Lofts.

The famous George W. Childs cup, offered by Mr. Childs, of the Philadelphia Ledger, arrived Friday afternoon, and is now on exhibition at the jewelry store of the Messrs. Voigt & Haas, on Seventh street northwest. This cup was won by Mr. H. Wagner, of Roslindale, Mass., for the record of his five birds in returning from St. Thomas, Ontario, to Roslindale, an air-line distance of 325 miles, in a little less than 11 hours, making an average speed of 1,350 yards per minute. The cup will be here for a week only, and is in charge of the Federation of Homing Pigeon fanciers, of Washington. Its value is \$200.

At the last Federation meeting, held Friday evening, Mrs. E. S. Starr, of the *Fanciers' Journal*, Philadelphia, was elected an honorary member.

Mr. E. Voigt has donated a handsome gold badge for a "catch and show" race to take place June 22, from Coveseville, Va., 120 miles distant, also a diamond badge for a race of 1890 batch birds, to take place some time during the month of September, from a station over 100 miles away.

The race from Orange, seventy-five miles, last Sunday, was won by the bird, "Lottie May," owned by Mr. B. F. Miller. The distance was made in two hours, liberated at 7:27; home, 9:27 A. M., followed closely by birds of the Messrs. Bishop, Hille, Stebbins, and others. All birds were reported home at 10 A. M. Today the birds are at Coveseville, 120 miles, to compete for a fine pair of shoes donated by Mr. Jacob Boel.

Next Sunday the "honorary member's" badge will be flown for from Amherst, Va., 150 miles.
