THE ARMY AND THE NAVY.

ARMY NOTES.

By direction of the President Major Samuel H. Horton, surgeon, has been detailed as a member of the Army retiring board at Los Angeles, Cal.

Captain Mahan has been ordered to take station at Washington, D. C., reporting in person to the Secretary of the Treasury for duty as engineer secretary of the light house board, relieving of that duty Major James F. Gregory, now on leave of absence.

A board of officers has been appointed to meet at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., Monday, December 21, 1891, to examine into and report upon the subject of post schools, libraries, reading and amusement rooms, and gymnasiums, and to transact such other business as may be referred to it. Detail for the board—Major Jacob Kline, Twenty-fourth Infantry; Major Camillo C. Carr, Eighth Cavalry, and Captain Hugh G. Brown, Twelfth Infantry.

Captain Crosby P. Miller, assistant quartermaster, has been ordered to proceed from this city to Fort Leavenworth, Kans., Fort Sheridan, Ill., and Fort Niagara, N. Y., on public business connected with the quartermaster's department, and, upon the completion thereof, will return to his proper station.

Major General Schofield has issued an order that all men who enter the Army shall be vaccinated by a medical officer, and re-enlisted men shall also be vaccinated unless they bear the mark of a previous vaccination.
