**HOW ABOUT HAWAII?**

**The Man-Faced Crab.**

One of the most singular looking creatures that ever walked the earth, or swam 'the water under the earth,' is the world-famous, man-faced crab of Japan. The body is hardly an inch in length, yet the head is fitted with a face which is the perfect counterpart of a Chinese coolie—a veritable missing link, with eyes, nose and mouth all clearly defined. This curious and uncanny creature, besides the great likeness it bears to a human being in the face, is provided with two legs which seem to grow from the top of its head and hang over the side of its face.

**Marriage a Failure.**

The Sultan's opinion on the subject might be to the point as to one system of marriage. According to recent estimates, his annual household expenditures are as follows: Repairs, new furniture, mats, beds, etc, 15,000,000 francs; toilet requisites, including rouge and enamels for the ladies of the harem and jewelry, 50,000,000 francs; extra 'extravagances,' 65,000,000 francs; clothes and furniture for the Sultan personally, 10,000,000 francs; douceurs and wages, 20,000,000 francs; gold and silver plate, 12,500,000 francs, maintenance of 500 carriages and horses, 2,500,000 francs—a total of 175,000,000 francs.

**Lightning.**

It is estimated by a competent authority that one's chances of being struck by lightning in a storm are as one in ten thousand.

This ought to be a comfortable fact for those who dwell in districts where electric storms are frequent. The same authority gives a list of objects and places to be avoided in thunderstorms, and the list includes trees, masts, high poles, lofty buildings, spires and steeples, water, stove pipes, bell wires, iron fences, crowds of people, droves of cattle, or other animals, umbrellas, walking sticks, and metal ornaments worn upon the body. The conclusion to be drawn from this is that the best thing to do in an electric storm is to put on your bathing suit and go out and sit in a paddock, though how one can even then avoid water in a storm it is difficult to see. There is comfort in the thought, however, that nine persons out of ten who are struck by lightning are never aware of the fact.
