**Japan and Hawaii.**

The Hawaiian question has received a considerable amount of attention. The prompt action of the Government in despatching a man-of-war to those islands, for the protection of Japanese there has been applauded by the press, excepting the *Kokumin Shinbun*, which states that the Cabinet has done only what it ought to do, and the *Jiyu Shinbun*, which blames the Minister of Foreign Affairs and of the Navy, for not having sent out a war vessel earlier. Lieutenant Sone, a retired officer of the Navy, is in Hawaii as a special correspondent of the *Radical* organ. He has been urging upon the home authorities the importance of stationing a war vessel in Hawaiian waters, and the *Jiyu* now states that, had his warning been duly attended to, there would have been no necessity for feeling any alarm at the present juncture.—(*Japan Mail*.)

**PRECEDENTS.**

**PRESIDENT TYLER'S REPLY TO SECRETARY WEBSTER.**

President Tyler, to whom the message was addressed, spoke as follows: "Considering, therefore, that the United States possesses so very large a share in the intercourse with those islands, it is deemed not unfit to make the declaration that this government seeks, nevertheless, no peculiar advantages, no exclusive control over the Hawaiian Government, but is content with its independent existence, and anxiously wishes for its security and prosperity.

**WHAT SECRETARY MARCY WROTE IN 1853.**

Secretary Marcy, in 1853, wrote: "While we do not intend to attempt the exercise of any exclusive control over them, we are resolved that no other power or State shall exact any political or commercial relations from them which we are not permitted to enjoy, far less to establish any protectorate over them."

**SECRETARY BLAINE TO MR. COMLY.**

Secretary Blaine, in writing to Mr. Comly, said: "The United States has declined, even at the request of the Hawaiian people, to assume over their affairs a protectorate, which would only be a thinly disguised domination, and confined its efforts and its influence to strengthen their government and open to their commerce and enterprise the readiest and most profitable connection with its markets, but this policy has been based upon a belief in the real and substantial independence of Hawaii."

**WHAT SECRETARY WEBSTER WROTE IN 1842.**

Secretary Webster in 1842 wrote on the question as follows: "The United States, therefore, are more interested in the fate of the islands and of their government than any other nation can be, and this consideration induces the President to be quite willing to declare as the sense of the government of the United States that the government of the Sandwich Islands ought to be respected; that no power, either, ought to take possession of the islands as a conquest or for the purpose of colonization, and that no power ought to seek for any exclusive rights or preferences with it in any manner of commerce."
