PATIENCE REWARDED

A Successful Che Fa Capture.

Many a time, and oft, has the eagle eye of the chief of Honolulu's police been cast to windward and toward the vicinity most distinctly located by the twin spires which marks the house of worship over which the Waterhouses hold control and which to seamen and landmen is known as Kaunakapili Church. Oft, in the dreary midnight hour, when all was still within the confines of the "coward," and Maunakea street; when not even a funeral wail was lifted from amongst that crowded portion of the community; when, but, rarely as it was, no lights flickered dimly through the darkness of the Tong Hing Sing joss-house; then, and often then, could have been seen shadowy forms which theosophic knowledge limned to perspicuity as those of Captain Andrews, and his followers brave.
