Burmah and the Burmese.
The Burmese are a very interesting and sociable race, fair in complexion, short, stout, well-proportioned, brave and hospitable, especially to strangers, whom they entertain free of charge. The man tattoo themselves with an indelible tint; their dress being smaller is not so handsome or graceful as the garments of India. The various titles of the nobility are not hereditary. Education is fairly advanced considering the state of the nation as regards other matters. Everyone is supposed to be able to read and write, palm leaves and books of ivory leaves supplying the place of paper, which is difficult to obtain. The literature consists of songs and chronological histories. Buddhism is the generally recognized religion of Burmah; the education of the people is entirely in the hands of the priests; formerly there were priestesses, but this order has been since abolished. Everything is at the disposal of the king, who is lord of the life and property of all his subjects. He has two councils, by means of which the royal orders are issued; many of the laws are very good, but the punishments are sometimes exceedingly cruel. The standing army is small, and composed of infantry with a small body of cavalry, but these are very inferior and badly equipped.—*See Am. Jour.*
