

**EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES, AGAIN.**

We recently took occasion to say, in speaking on the general subject of employers and employees, that there was need of some statutory provision for the protection of the former against the violation of an implied contract. We referred particularly to instances where laborers employed by the day or week, or domestic servants, suddenly and without notice, leave their employers, who have no legal remedy against what may prove not only an annoyance, but a serious loss. Since the date on which we called attention to this subject, we have read in Eastern papers that the New Penal Code of the State of New York, (which however does not go into effect until December next) includes a particular chapter on this very subject. We regret that we are unable to find the enactment in full, but we gather from the papers that it provides for the punishment of persons who break contracts of service, or hiring, implied or written, knowing that the probable consequence will be to pecuniarily damage persons or property. The enactment apparently takes special cognizance of organized "strikes," as for example: When workmen on an iron furnace agree to quit work just as the molten metal is ready for casting; when compositors on a newspaper withdraw at an hour, purposely, so late as to prevent the issuing of next day's paper; or when railroad hands stop at a fixed time along the line of a road, leaving the cars, passengers and freight wherever they may happen to be at the moment.

We again beg to call the attention of our law-makers, now in session, to this subject.

**PROHIBITION.**

The question of license or no license being prominent in this community at present, it is interesting to read in the newspapers that the most important measure also in Ohio politics this year will be the liquor question. The Republicans have taken a decided position on this subject, and their action has alienated both the beer-drinking classes and the prohibitionists. Since 1871 the law in regard to the sale of liquor was strictly prohibitory. The Smith bill, which the Republicans are responsible for, lays a tax on the amount of liquor sold. The prohibitionists believe that this is a retrograde movement, although the prohibitory law could never be enforced. Still they contended that the moral effect of a prohibitory law is very great. The Germans of Cincinnati and Cleveland are opposed to the new measure, because it destroys the "free-ium" trade that was carried on in defiance of the prohibitory law. The Republicans have lost the German vote and the prohibitionists' but they feel confident that this loss will be made good by an increased following among the farmers. Judge Higley of Cincinnati, who convicted a very influential liquor dealer for violating the Sunday law and sentenced him to thirty days' imprisonment, seems to be the favorite of the Republicans for Secretary of State, the most important office to be filled at the next election.

**LEGISLATIVE.**

Thursday, June 15.—The time having passed in which petitions can be presented (except on Monday of each week) the Rules were suspended, and the following were read and referred:

From Koolaupoko, in favor of a Ten Million Loan.

From the same district, that the present law in regard to Sunday observance be undisturbed.

From the same, that tenants on Konohiki's lands have the preference in purchasing such lands.

From Makawao, that Crown Lands be leased to native Hawaiians only.

Mr. Kaulukou from the Judiciary Committee, reported adversely to the petition from Kona, Hawaii, praying that there be three Circuit Judges appointed for that Island. After some discussion, in which it was stated by Mr. Nahinu that the Circuit Judge came into Kona to hear appeals only about once a year, and sometimes the intervals were even longer, so that sometimes justice failed to be done, the report of the Committee was accepted.

The same committee reported on various petitions referred to them, most of which, on their recommendation, were tabled.

The select committee on the bill to repeal the law of Patent rights, reported a substitute, which passes to a second reading.

The Attorney-General read first time a bill to provide another term of the Circuit Court for the Island of Hawaii, to be held in Kan, in the month of November each year.

Mr. Nakaleka offered a resolution to the effect that whereas, a paragraph ridiculing members of the Assembly has appeared in the *Daily Advertiser and Etete*, the Sergeant-at-Arms be instructed to expel the reporters of those journals. Indefinitely postponed.

Mr. Keau proposes an appropriation of \$5,000 for a bridge over the stream at Moanalua.

Mr. Lilikalani read first time his Ten Million Dollar Loan Bill, by the title. Ordered printed.

The further consideration of the Tax Bill was postponed until Saturday.

The order of the day was then taken up, which was the third reading of the bill to provide a Police Justice for North Kohala. Passed finally.

The bill to amend section 978 of the Civil Code (bankruptcy) passed a final reading.

The bill to amend the law respecting the descent of property, was read a second time and referred to a select committee, consisting of Messrs. Widemann, Pilipo, Aholo, the Attorney-General, and Nakaleka.

The bill to amend the Act releasing contract laborers from work on Saturday, came up on its second reading.

The Attorney-General opposed the bill. It proposed to interfere with contracts already made, and that could not be done by the passage of any law—it would be in the nature of an *ex post facto* law.

Mr. Mott Smith opposed the bill on one ground—it was contrary to the law of Moses, which says "Six days shalt thou labor," &c.

Mr. Widemann said that as a general thing employers allowed their men Saturdays in which to cultivate their own garden patches and do chores for themselves.

Messrs. Pilipo, Kauhane and Palohau followed in support of the bill, and Mr. Bishop against. The motion to indefinitely postpone was carried, 21 to 18. Adjourned.
