

**SAVE THE FORESTS.**

It appears that our reporter was wrong in his figures yesterday as to the vote in the Legislature by which was stricken out the item in the Appropriation Bill—"Care of forests, nurseries, improvements of lands and public places;" the vote was 22 ayes to 18 noes, as we are now informed, instead of 22 to 11. And this recurrence to the subject gives us an opportunity to say a few words thereon. It is certainly not to be wondered at that the Representatives, who are with but one or two exceptions native Hawaiians, and have no acquaintance whatever with the great mass of what has been written and published and thoroughly demonstrated about the vital necessity of forests to any country,—should fail to see any wisdom in paying out the public money for the care or preservation of forests. They know that so many "piles" of firewood bring so much hard-coin; but they do not know, and cannot easily be made to understand, that the persistent destruction of forests inevitably leads to the drying up of the water supply, and the turning of the land so denuded of its natural covering, into an arid, uninhabitable waste. Even if convinced that such would be the sure result of present improvidence, and that posterity must suffer the consequences, they would be likely to inquire, like the Hibernian, we read of—"What has posterity done for us?" After us the deluge, appears to be the sentiment. But it is most assuredly a cause for surprise and regret, that among so many well educated and well-read foreign born gentlemen to be found among the Nobles—and we may add, the Ministry—there should be but one, the Hon. Mr. Cleghorn, with sufficient public spirit to stand up for the proposed measure. We trust, however, that as has been intimated, the vote may be reconsidered, and a proper provision be made for the preservation of forests and the care of our public breathing places.

**LEGISLATIVE.**

Thursday, June 22.—On a suspension of the rules, Mr. Gariner read a petition from Hans, Maui, that the collection of *aloua*, and other fibrous substances growing on government lands, be free to the people. Also a petition from the same district, that government assume the cost of independent English schools in the different districts, and also the tuition fees of parents of large families.

On account of the continued illness of Mr. Nawahi, Mr. Widemann was appointed Chairman of the Committee of Finance.

Mr. Kauai gave notice of intention to introduce a bill to amend Sections 3 to 8 inclusive of Chapter 9 of the Penal Code, in the native version only, by inserting the words "at hard labor."

Mr. Kalua read first time a bill to make a permanent provision for the widow of the late P. Nahaolelua. (\$300 per annum). Referred.

The order of the day—the consolidated Tax Bill—was taken up in committee of the whole. A lengthy discussion ensued on the bill of Mr. Kauai, which provides for the collection and payment of the taxes on contract laborers by the master, who is to be held responsible therefor. The Attorney-General opposed the bill, which was supported by Messrs. Aholo, Kalua, Kauai and others. Without coming to a vote the committee rose and the Assembly adjourned for lunch.

The afternoon session was occupied, at first, with the Taxation Bill, and Mr. Kauai's supplementary bill, which was eventually referred to a special committee. But the sensation of the afternoon was a resolution offered by Mr. Keau, to the effect, That, whereas, the *Hawaiian Gazette* of Wednesday had indulged in insulting remarks regarding that gentleman, intimating that he was a fit candidate for the Insane Asylum, therefore that the reporter of that newspaper be expelled from the floor of the Assembly. A rather lengthy and somewhat amusing debate ensued, in which many of the members took part, at the close of which a motion to indefinitely postpone the resolution was carried by a large majority. Thereupon the Assembly adjourned.

The Revival meeting last evening was fully attended, and the evidences are that the interest will be maintained throughout the series, which it is proposed to extend a week larger. The meeting to-night takes the form of "Gospel Temperance."
