A Warm Brick.

Mrs. Battles, says Max Adeler, suffers from cold feet, and the other night she warmed up a brick, intending to take it to bed with her. It hit a policeman who happened to be standing on the pavement below, and in less than ten minutes Battles was on his way to the station house, where he was locked up all night on a charge of assault and battery.
