OBITUARY.

The late Charles T. Dillingham was born in Southborough, Mass., on Sept. 5th, 1853. He lived in Worcester, Mass., and also in Detroit, Mich., before he came here in 1876, with his newly married wife. He then went into his brother's employ, and about three years ago went into Messrs. Castle & Cooke's office.

From this it will be seen that his life was spent in an active career of usefulness, as a kind and loving husband and father, a useful citizen, and best of all, a true Christian. His death has cast quite a gloom over the town, as he was universally known and respected.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon. At 4 o'clock the service at the Bethel commenced. It was led both by the Revs. Mr. Damon and Mr. Cruzan. The choir sang some very touching hymns. The funeral procession was the longest known in Honolulu. All the leading business houses were closed. At the grave, after the Rev. Mr. Damon had officiated, the Odd Fellows closed round the grave and performed the funeral rites of their order.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The new steamship Stirling Castle, from Hankow, China, lately reached London, after a run of 29 days and 22 hours, the fastest on record. The distance from Hankow to London is 11,250 miles, so that the Stirling Castle made an average of more than 375 miles a day, making no allowance for detention at coaling ports and time occupied in passing through the Suez Canal.
