LONDON GOSSIP.

The somewhat bizarre action of the Maharajah Duleep Singh in aunouncing his intention of coming forward as a candidate for the parliamentary representation of Whitby, "at the next general election," without mention of politics and without placing himself in communication with either the political party in the borough, has caused no little surprise, stir, and comment. It may not be generally known that some twenty years ago his Highness with a large retinue was the tenant of Mulgrave Castle, near Whitby, the seat of the Marquis of Normanby, and became very popular in the town and neighbourhood, not only by reason of his princely munificence, but because of his ardour and success as a sportsman and his zeal for public improvement in the locality.

The new Police-master of St. Petersburg, General Gresser, is of a different stamp to the old one. Kozloff's favourite mode of inspection was to drive about full speed in a carriage with a mounted policeman, on special occasions, bawling in front.
