THOMAS Mathews was charged with assault on Saturday and found not guilty. The trouble was about a woman. Three cases were remanded.

Mr. GIBSON said in the days of "Auld Lang Syne" that his paper was "the only independent press—till it got the Government printing."

THE tax collector at Nawiliwili stopped some Chinamen, who were coming down on the C. R. Bishop last week, because they had not paid their five dollars a head.

THE two band concerts on Saturday were well patronized, especially the one at the hotel in the evening. The Saturday night band concerts appear to be the most popular.

"Ed. Smith" a chestnut colt, foaled in 1880, bred by Mr. W. L. Pritchard of Sacramento, California, and the owner of a blue-blooded pedigree, was much admired on Saturday when ridden about town by his owner Mr. E. R. Miles.

THE programme for the regatta is published to-day. Entries will be received by Mr. J. W. Robertson and subscriptions by Mr. Henry Macfarlane. The value of the prizes must depend upon the amount of subscriptions received and will be published this week.

Messrs. Lyons & Levey sold, on Saturday, a section, having a frontage of 23 ft. 6 in. to King St. and 220 ft. to Punchbowl St. with all the buildings thereon, for \$2,615. Mr. Lazarus was the purchaser. A taro patch at Kalihi, about a tenth of an acre, was sold to Mr. Rebello for \$90.

MR. T. H. DAVIES gives a very plain denial to the remarks made by the Working Men's Union concerning his connection with the boiler makers. Mr. J. Hatton was the gentleman who interviewed Mr. Davies concerning them, and not Mr. Crowley, as erroneously reported in the Advertiser.

THE work of landing the immigrants was commenced on Saturday morning, shortly after seven o'clock. They were all on shore before eleven, and before three in the afternoon their baggage was landed. The work is said to have been done quicker and better than on any previous occasion.

THE present premier spoke once of Hawaiians, as "an ignorant, credulous, gossiping native people." What has produced the change? "Is it the change that has come over him. The Crown in his pocket that makes him think better of a Crown, and jingling Sovereigns that gives him a high appreciation of a Sovereign?"

HIS Excellency the British Commissioner will commence an inquiry this morning into the cause of the death of the second cook of the Bell Rock, who was shot by the chief officer about a week after leaving San Miguel. It is said that the cook threatened to "knife" the mate who acted in self defence and intended to fire over the cook's head.

THE manager of Spreckelsville, Mr. Williams, presented his base-ball team with a champion bat, on their return home. The bat is 10 feet long, 2 feet wide, and made of 2-inch imported plank.
