"HALF-HEARTED."

The last issue of the Weekly Advertiser contained a curious blending of truth and fiction. In the editorial columns it was stated, in connection with His Majesty's birthday, that the "programme of rejoicings was not very elaborate, being confined to the expenditure of some gunpowder on salutes at sunrise, noon and sunset, and a half-hearted sort of regatta." In the account of the regatta we were told "never before was the birthday of His Majesty, King Kalakaua, celebrated with such eclat, and universal enjoyment was visible in all directions."

The local writer, notwithstanding the "Honolulu atmosphere," had evidently acquired an "ebullition of enthusiasm;" and possibly his "enthusiasm" attained "the active state" with "the aid of Green Seal or Heidsieck Monopole." We agree with the editorial writer, the regatta was "half-hearted." The attendance was not so large as that at the previous year's regatta, the prizes were smaller, owing to the unwillingness of people to contribute, the foreign residents were hardly represented, some of those who assisted, regretting that they had done so, and the regatta of 1883 was generally admitted to have been "slow." That the "enthusiasm" was "passive" was most perceptible when His Majesty's yacht, the Healani, passed the wharf, an easy winner. Where were the cheers and applause of last year? But drunkenness was in its "active state."

There is a reason for this, and the reason is not far to seek. It is in the person of Walter Murray Gibson, His Majesty's chief adviser. The foreign residents have a personal and political dislike to the Premier. It is a well-known fact that, if a subscription list is taken through the town with Mr. Gibson's name on it, the business community will not subscribe. A separate list has to be prepared for the city, and this was done for the late regatta. Even that did not make it a success. It was only "half-hearted." If the Premier were removed from office, and another regatta were to be held in a month's time, what a change there would be in the day's celebration. The refusals to subscribe would be few, the prizes would be larger, enthusiasm and interest would be apparent, and there would be no occasion to say that it was "half-hearted." Mr. Gibson has not only made a failure of his government, but he is also making a failure of His Majesty, who, if still blinded by his wily chief, will one day be rudely awakened. From the "half-hearted" remarks of our contemporary, his real sentiment is evident, and would, if expressed, for once represent public opinion. In conclusion we quote our contemporary, with the alteration of three words: "It will be good for the future of this country, good for the interests of all who have invested their money here, and made it their home, if" the Premier's "reign be a" brief "one."

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

Captain Turner, of the W. G. Irwin, has kindly given us a copy of the S. F. Lita, of 2nd Nov., from which we take the following later news.

A filibustering party from the United States is reported to have landed in Havana, near Santa Spiritus.

Sanitary precautions have been ordered at all the German ports, owing to the outbreak of cholera at Peking.

A desperate fight has taken place at Kocanie, Herzegovina, between Russian gendarmes and robbers. Several of the robbers were killed.

Aylward, who achieved fame as the leader of the Boers in the Transvaal war against the British, is in Chicago.

Frank James, the notorious outlaw, under arrest at Gallatin, Mo., was given the freedom of the town and with his wife and child walked about visiting the stores at will.

Londonderry, November 1st.—This evening, while the procession escorting the Lord Mayor of Dublin to his hotel was passing the City Hall, some Orangemen fired upon it and threw slates from the windows and roofs. One man was wounded and is dying. The police charged and cleared the streets. The military were called out, the Lancers parading Main street. There is intense anxiety in all circles. The Orangemen later vacated the City Hall and have withdrawn from the vicinity.

London, November 1st.—The Daily Telegraph says: We are enabled to state that the views of the Chinese Embassy as to Wednesday's vote in the French Chamber, expressing confidence in the Ministry, is the first step toward war, and M. Ferry asks for a grant of money to despatch reinforcements to Tonquin forthwith.

Paris, November 1st.—Maquis Tseng intimated to-day that M. Tricou's telegram, which was very opportune for the Ferry Government, was the result of a suggestion telegraphed from Paris.

General Millet succeeds General Bonet as commander of the troops in Tonquin.

DRILL IN SCHOOLS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Noticing the late review of school-work which appeared in the BULLETIN, it is with some surprise that I saw the entire absence of military drill, as portion of the school-work. It is the more worthy of remark in that, 9 out of say 13 of the children, are gifted with deformed feet and rounded shoulders. In nearly all other countries noticeably Australia and New Zealand, drill is so essential a portion of the work, that each headmaster is required to have held a Captain's commission of volunteers. The boys themselves in many of the schools, being armed, uniformed and equipped in regulation form at the Government expense. Without advocating the uniform, which their more fortunate conferees of the south enjoy, it is surely not too much to ask that a visiting drill-instructor should be engaged, who could attend all the schools and inspect this much need instruction to the children. Mr. Atkinson's school is at present, I believe, the only one that has gone the lengths of noticing the deficiency. I except the Bishop's School which did have an instructor some time back, but is, at the present time, without one.


