THE WORKING MEN'S UNION.

The regular meeting took place on Tuesday evening. One new member was elected.

The executive committee reported that the application, in the case of the German laborers, for a mandamus to allow an appeal, from the police justice at Koloa, to be reheard in the Supreme Court was dismissed. Mr. Ward appeared for the appellant, Karl Klemme, and Mr. Whiting for the Attorney-General. His Honor heard the case on its merits though it might have been dismissed on a technical point. The appellant had not complied with the forms necessary to secure an appeal, through ignorance of the law, and because he had no legal tender coin to pay the fine and costs of the appeal. The committee recommended that the work of the Union should be chiefly educational in future and that they should try to supplement the present institutions by something useful which was not yet provided.

A letter, from Mr. E. ff. Ward, was read, concerning the case of the Germans.

The employment committee reported that the labor market was in a deplorable condition, that there were fifty applicants for one job. This was substantiated by Mr. Wiseman. That ten men from Koloa had tried to obtain work but seven or eight had returned.

Mr. Ward asked if the committee of German residents had paid for the expenses of the women while in charge of the Union and why the committee had not reported.

The Committee were instructed to report at the next meeting, especially as to the recoupment.

Special votes of thanks were passed to Mr. Gartenberg for the use of his hall on two evenings; to Messrs. Hebbard and Ashley and Messrs. S. M. Carter & Co., for their free cartage of the baggage of the German women; and to Mrs. Jarret for her donation of a lamp and table.

It was agreed to send copies of the resolutions to the German syndicate.

It was decided, in consequence of the small attendance, owing to the inclemency of the weather, to postpone the nomination of officers till 26th Inst., when they would be elected, due notice to be given and the candidates to be elected by ballot.

Mr. Crowley hoped to make the Union of an educational character, he would like to see the walls hung with diagrams, and desks round the rooms during some evenings and, on others, to have interesting discussions on entertaining topics. Working men were competent to impart instruction beneficial to artisans and would do so. He recommended men to join the free drawing class at the Y. M. C. A. He referred to the Trades Union in Melbourne, which now had a splendid building and taught young men who were a credit to the institution.

Mr. Cavenagh desired to have classes and thought they had as much ability as the Y. M. C. A. Mr. Kohn was hard to beat in drawing, and, if Mr. Sherman taught native, he would be on the same footing as the chief justice.

Mr. Ward thought that Hawaiian and figuring were most necessary, the former so as to get on in this country, and the latter to assist them in getting into the Government when they would be able to understand figures *pro* and *con*.

Mr. Marchand recommended the appointment of a doctor to examine members before their admission to see if they had tongues. It was not fair for a few to do all the talking.

Mr. Crowley hoped that, at the next meeting they would elect an entirely fresh set of men. They had raised the number from five to its present strength, but many causes had hindered their growth, chiefly the German business which they had never contemplated. He then referred to his being called an Australian agitator by the *aturday Press*. He had written to the proprietor and editor, but had received no reply. He had never been an agitator but had never hesitated to put his hand to what he believed to be good and true. He would always stand to his post and act his part as a man.

The meeting adjourned to 26th instant.

GAZETTE CHARTER.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Your daily contemporary, in referring to the judge's decision in the Gazette Charter case says, "The principal applicant for this charter is not a Hawaiian subject and the question presents itself whether a privilege of this sort, which is not awarded to foreigners in most countries, is really his due." Your contemporary may be correct in saying "most countries," but if he intends to include the countries from which Hawaii borrows her laws and usages—the United States and the British Empire—I have the impression that he is wrong. I believe that charters are awarded to applicants, in the United States without any question of nationality. Will you or some of your readers kindly inform me if I am right? This one thing is certain, that a large proportion of the capital of chartered corporations in the United States is foreign capital. Moreover, I am told that charters have been granted in this Kingdom to foreigners. Would the *Advertiser* allow the privilege to one foreigner and withhold it from another, thus making "fish of one and fowl of the other?" Surely, no man who desires the commercial and financial prosperity of the country can wish to see foreign capital kept out of it; and certainly the debarring of foreigners from procuring charters of incorporation is saying in plain language, "We don't want your money." Talking of "Hawaiian subjects," there are many foreigners long resident in this country, who have made it their permanent home and are loyal to the sovereign and to the law, although they have not undergone the formality of naturalization. Are these men to be over-riden by men who have come more recently to the country, and whose loyalty is merely proportionate to the number of dollars and cents they can make out of it?
