An examination was held yesterday by Mr. Dayton on the body of a Chinaman, who died on board the steamer Jas. Makee, the deputy marshal decided from the evidence before him in general terms that "death from exhaustion" was the only decision to be arrived at.

A Chinaman appeared in Court yesterday morning in a fearfully damaged state, he had a warrant for assault and battery at Honolulu where as it took place at Ewa. Judge Bickerton declined to issue any such irregular warrant as an infringement of the Ewa magistrate's privileges, the offence was committed within the jurisdiction of the magistrate of the Ewa district.

ANOTHER mob of sheep invaded the city this morning. Of course they were going in the opposite direction to that which they should have gone, of course the drivers were acting as brutally as usual. One very pleasing incident happened in this connection. One native, who attempted the innocent liberty of riding over the sheep, was promptly thrown down and walked on. It is abominable that sheep should be ill-treated so much, especially as they have to be eaten by some of us.

TO THE VOLCANO.

By a new advertisement in today's BULLETIN, it will be seen that Messrs. Foster & Co. are issuing through tickets, and return, to the volcano, for \$60, which includes horses, guides, board and lodging, from the time of departure from Honolulu until return. The round trip by the steamer Planter occupies seven days, giving ample time to tourists of four days to visit the volcano, sulphur baths, and many other interesting scenes. At present tourists will be landed at Punaluu, thence by railroad to Pahala, where horses and guides will be in attendance. In the course of a few months the long and weary ride on horseback from Pahala to the volcano will be dispensed with. A fine carriage road is now being made—10 miles, it is expected, will be completed in about two months—when a large and comfortable four-horse bus will run from Pahala to the Volcano House. A commodious and handsome passenger car is now being built for the Pahala Railroad for the accommodation of tourists.
