The body arrived in the city this morning at half-past three o'clock, and the funeral took place this afternoon from his late residence on Emma street.

AN amusing incident occurred at Pearl River yesterday. A party of natives left the shore in a small dingy to go to the schooner Mokoala anchored outside. When within about twelve yards of her the dingy turned bottom upwards leaving the natives floundering in the water. One of them had a guitar with him and he might have been seen swimming with one hand and holding up the guitar out of the water with the other. All reached the schooner in safety.

On going out to ascertain the cause of so much noise, he discovered a large lizard about three feet long of a deep slate and blackish color, belonging to the Gecko species. CANNED PROVISIONS.

THE following suggestions as to canned goods are by Dr. J. G. Johnson of New York: Reject every can that does not show the line of resin around the edge of the solder on the cap the same as is seen on the seam at the side of the can.

"Standard" or first-class goods, have not only the name of the factory, but also that of the wholesale house

which sells them, on the label.

"Seconds" or doubtful or "reprocess" goods have a stock label of some mythical canning house, but do not have the names of any wholesale grocer. Reject all goods that do not bear the name of the factory and also of some wholesale firm.

A "swell" or decomposing can of goods can always be detected by pressing in the bottom of the can. A sound can pressed, will give a solid feel. When gas from the decomposition of the food is inside the can, the tin will rattle by pressing up the bottom as you displace the gas in the can.

Reject every can that shows any rust around the cap on the inside of the head of the can. If housewives are educated to these points, then muriate of zinc amalgam will become a thing of the past, and dealers in damaged cans will retire.


