By the Steamer Likelike which arrived this morning, news was received, that Hattie, the eight year old daughter of Hon Sam Parker, died at Mana, Hawaii, on Sunday evening last at half past nine o'clock, of fever. Hon J. P. Parker and Mrs. Parker left by the Kinau this afternoon, and the funeral will take place soon after their arrival at Mana.

Mr. D. D. Baldwin, Inspector-general of schools, arrived from Maui by the Kinau. During his visit on that Island he has been present at the examinations and exercises of nearly all the government schools, and speaks in the highest terms of what he has seen. The Wailuku School under Mr. Moore is in a most satisfactory state, that gentleman being a very superior teacher. At Waihee, Makawao and other places Mr. Baldwin was very much pleased with the results.

BETWEEN five and six o'clock yesterday afternoon, on King Street, a half-white boy named Charles Peter climbed on to the top of a dray-load of rice straw, which was being brought into town for S. M. Carter & Co. The boy accidentally fell off, and one off the hinder wheels of the dray passed over his head. He was picked up in an insensible condition by the driver, who summoned a native close by, and had him convey the poor boy to the Police Station, where he soon afterwards died. Deputy Marshal Dayton summoned a Jury and an inquest will be held this afternoon as soon as the Police Court has adjourned.


