

the people. He hoped the item, which only represented the payment of four men, would pass.

Mr. Bishop moved to make the item \$700; Mr. Bush, to make it \$2,000, and Mr. W. O. Smith, \$1,800. The latter, while acknowledging the self-sacrificing labors of Mr. Cleghorn, thought a more systematic management would have produced better results.

Mr. Bishop withdrew his amendment and the item carried over the others.

The time of the Committee having elapsed, it rose and reported, and, on motion of Mr. W. O. Smith, the House again went into Committee of the Whole on the Appropriation Bill, Mr. Walker in the chair.

Emma Square, \$700. Passed. Hawaiian Agricultural Society, \$5,000.

Mr. W. O. Smith moved to reduce to \$1,000, Mr. Kanealii to strike out, Mr. Cleghorn to reduce to \$4,000, and Mr. Richardson to reduce to \$2,500. \$1,000 carried.

Mr. Dole moved to insert \$800 for keeping the grass on the parade ground, Makiki Reserve.

Mr. Kanealii, being apprised that this was private property, objected to contributing to the amusement of other people.

Mr. Richardson raised the point of order that this being a new item, could not come in until the third reading, whereupon the motion was withdrawn.

Upon the police items recommended by the Select Committee coming up, Mr. Mott Smith moved they be passed en gros.

Minister Neumann objected to this wholesale procedure. While the items had been carefully considered, he withheld his signature as a member of the committee to the report because he dissented from the majority in certain points. He adverted to the lack of appropriation for street lighting in Honolulu. At least fifty more lights were needed. The idea of scattering 102 or 103 lamps over the magnificent distances of this place and calling it lighting the streets.

Mr. Dole thought the \$10,000 for lights could be made to go a great deal farther than it does now. Citizens of Honolulu were accustomed to see lights burning at 9 o'clock in the day.

Minister Neumann said the lights were contracted for at so much a night.

Mr. Richardson moved an amendment to consider the report item by item, which carried.

Deputy Marshal of Honolulu, \$250 a month, \$6,000. Passed. Six police at \$90 a month, \$12,960.

Mr. Kaulukou moved that one native police captain have \$100 a month, the rest of the appropriation to be disposed of later. Carried.

Mr. Kaulukou moved that one foreign police captain have \$100 a month. Carried.

Mr. Kaulukou moved that five police captains have \$95 a month.

Mr. Kaunamano moved an amendment to give the five \$90 a month.

Mr. Kaee moved an amendment that four have \$80 a month.

Mr. Richardson moved an amendment that five have \$100 a month.

The motion for five at \$90 a month each was passed.

Two police officers at \$50 a month, \$2,400.

The item passed at \$60 over the original item and amendments for \$75 and \$65.

Two police officers at \$45 a month. Amended to \$50.

Five police officers at \$40 a month. Time was again called during a heated debate upon this item.

The Committee rose and reported, and the House adjourned until 10 o'clock, A. M., on Friday.


