SHIPPING NOTES.

Schr Reporter, Capt Cooke, arrived at Kahului April 29th, 78 days from Australia, bringing with her a cargo of coal for the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Co. The Captain says that during 32 days his average time was 26 miles per day. He says that only one day's course was steered, and the rest were merely head winds. Star W G Hall brought 2773 bags of sugar, 70 bags of coffee, 111 bags of wax, 113 hives, 27 head of cattle, 1 horse and 7 hogs. The purser reports abundance of rain at Kona and Kau. The sailing of the Morning Star is postponed until Saturday next. The Claus Spreckels sailed this day for San Francisco with 6868 bags of sugar valued at \$38,992.20. Star Iwalani brought 3286 bags of sugar. The brig W H Meyer arrived this morning, 27 days from San Francisco with a general cargo. She is docked at Brewer's wharf. Star Jas Makee sails to-morrow morning at 8 o'clock for Waianae, Waialua, Kihuna, Hanalei and Kapa. The star W G Hall brings news of a steady and incessant rain for eleven days at Kau. Schr Malolo brought 2300 bags of sugar from Kawaihalahi.
