INTER-ISLAND NAVIGATION.

About every two or three years a name is obliterated from the official list of the small Hawaiian mercantile fleet. Another vessel is bought to supply the place of the preceding one, and occasionally is re-named after her unfortunate predecessor. To the unobservant eye, there is no apparent change. To-day a Liholilo is reported missing, to-morrow another schooner arrives from the coast, the original name discarded, and the word Liholilo or some other significant Hawaiian name is painted on the stern. She is placed on the Hawaii, Kauai, or Maui route, as circumstances may demand, and there being no material difference in the build of the new vessel and the old, there is nothing said about the change. The shipper sends his goods to the wharf and they reach the destination as formerly. It may be true that a shipment made the previous quarter has not turned up, but the order has been duplicated, and beyond a slight inconvenience to a few hundred plantation hands by a temporary delay, nothing of importance has happened. The (supposed) vessel was insured, the cargo was insured, so everything is all right. In fact, it may be looked upon as a general benefit to all concerned. An old craft gone to the bottom, insurance money paid up without a question, a new vessel built, a second-hand one bought and a small reserve fund left for Suspense Account. Such is the happy-go-lucky style in which a large portion of our mercantile marine has hitherto been conducted. Let us reflect for a moment and look at such an occurrence in its true light.

What? Has nothing happened? Has nothing been lost beyond a few hundred dollars' worth of perishable merchandise? The answer to these grave questions suggests another question or two. Where are the crew, lost or saved? Who was captain of the missing vessel, and was he a competent navigator, both theoretical and practical? Was the first mate able to take sights and prick off the vessel's position on the chart? Finally, was there a soul on board that craft that knew the first rudiments of navigation?

These and similar questions must suggest themselves to every thoughtful mind that has a care about a fellow-being. It is not our duty to answer these questions, but we feel a perfect right in asking them. They are not intended for any individual in particular, but for Hawaiian shipowners in general. These thoughts are naturally suggested by the recently missing schooner Ka Moi. It may be that the captain was a navigator and a thoroughly competent man, but it was not necessary, by law, that he should be so. There is no Board of Marine Examiners on these islands. There ought to be. When a man is placed in charge of a vessel, he should be compelled to show a local or foreign certificate of competency, and in failing to do so he should be held not competent to take charge of valuable property and the lives of his fellow-beings on the high seas. Let a law be passed as soon as practicable, empowering the appointment of a Board of Examiners. It is not necessary to wait until another vessel is missed and a few lives lost. The marine record already gives a sufficient number of appalling losses. Let Hawaii take a small leaf out of

the book of that great commercial nation that carries 80 per cent. of the world's produce. No foreign-trading or coasting vessel sails the seas under the British flag without a certificated master.

Shipowners need not fear an inconvenience from the enactment of such a law. Navigation is easily learned. There are lots of white men on the islands who are capable of imparting the knowledge to the natives (if so be that it is absolutely necessary that schooners be run solely by Hawaiians), or who are willing to take charge of schooners provided they get properly paid for their services.

But these latter remarks are beside the main question. Let the insurance companies take this matter up and refuse to take risks excepting the conditions we have ventured to suggest are complied with, and we feel sure that the steamboat and schooner owners will find it to their benefit to have their vessels sailed by men who, when blown off the land, can find their way back to a haven of safety, without trusting to luck to be picked up by a passing steamer or ship.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

On the fourth page of this issue appears an account of the Wyoming massacre, given by the Chinese Consul at San Francisco who went to investigate the matter. It will be seen that the perpetrators of the awful outrages were worse than savage Europeans—contract laborers imported by the Union Pacific Railway Company. The results of the massacre may take a retributive form against that corporation, for its efforts in degrading labor to its own advantage.

As gold goes up, prices go down. It has always been the case. Conversely, the establishment of the silver dollar as the monetary standard would break the deadlock and cause trade to revive. For while gold has been rising in value, silver has kept company with other products of human industry, and is, therefore, a truer measure of their value. The fall in prices would be arrested, and men could make investments with a reasonable assurance of profitable returns. The silver dollar has never checked enterprise. It has stimulated it.—*Examiner.*

If the above is true, Hawaii ought to be the most enterprising country on the face of the earth, and prices ought to rule very low.


