AN EXCITING INCIDENT.

An exciting incident occurred on Nuuanu Avenue yesterday afternoon. Mr. S. F. Graham, while hauling a boiler from the old ice works, to Puna, on a dray, got stuck on the road, and telephoned for assistance. One of Hebbard's large drays went out and gave Graham a lift. The hind wheel of Graham's dray was tied with a rope for descending the hill, and both teams started. As soon as the load was in motion, the rope that held the wheel of the back dray parted, and the boiler shot forward, pushing both teams, and frightening the horses. They went at a furious rate until opposite Wood's, where one of Graham's horses fell, which caused the dray to swing around, and run into a fence. Hebbard's team was stopped by the spectators, and they can feel assured they have his hearty thanks. One of Graham's horses was pretty badly hurt. The boiler was allowed to remain on the road until this morning.

THE BRUNHILDE.

The American schooner yacht "Brunhilde" entered the harbor just before dark last evening, under flying jib and reefed fore-sail. When opposite the lighthouse, she lowered her foresail and with the remaining sail went to near the cattle landing, where anchor was dropped. The "Brunhilde" is commanded by her owner, Mr. J. J. Phelps, of Englewood, N. J., who has a crew of 16 men, consisting of first and second officers a boatswain, two stewards, two cooks, and nine sailors before the mast. The yacht sailed from New York fourteen months ago for a voyage around the world. She has visited all the principal ports of the East by the way of the Suez Canal, going to San Francisco from Hongkong, and from San Francisco to Monterey. She made the run from the last named place to Honolulu in 11 days and three hours. The vessel is 119 tons register, carries fore and main top-masts, and is a splendid sea boat. The saloon and staterooms of the yacht are superbly finished with rose and cherry woods, handsomely furnished, spacious and comfortable. The Brunhilde will remain here about 10 days, during which time Captain Phelps and his guest, Mr. Hillard, will probably collect many curios. Sailing from this port the yacht will make her course for Callao, S. A.
