who has been in Australia for the

Mr. Williamson a noted theatrical
manager, was a through passenger
by the Australia yesterday, on a visit
to her mother in the States.

The weather on Kaula is about
the same as it is in Honolulu.

Mr. Gonzales took about a dozen
different photographic views of the
procession on Saturday last.

The steamer W. G. Hall is due
here from Hawaii, and Maui, on
Thursday morning next.

Mr. R. N. Webster, head freight
clerk of the L. I. S. N. Co., is trying
to sell a \$10,000 museum.

Mr. Fred Wilhelm, formerly purs-
er of the Planter and now Kaula agent
for the L. I. S. N. Co., will be married
next Thursday, to Mrs P. Richmond,
of Waimea, Kaula.

Mr. Stayner's little 3 year old boy

J. A. Cummins horse, during the
procession on Saturday. Dr. Trou-
saut dressed the wound.

The Macfie-Rison wedding will
take place to-morrow at the English
Church. The bridal couple will leave
for Kilauea, Kaula, in the afternoon,
by the steamer Iwalani.

The purser of the S. S. Australia
reports having received the North-
east trades south of the line, and
being dead ahead slightly retarded
the progress of the steamer.

The steamship Australia arrived
from New Zealand shortly after noon
yesterday, and sailed for San Fran-
cisco between 9 and 10 o'clock last
night.

The "Alta California" of Oct. 31st
represents J. D. Spreckels as saying
that it was the intention of the Ha-
waiian Government "to float the
bonds in England, and the payment
is secured by a mortgage on the
Hawaiian revenues."

SAMOA.

A letter by the Australia yester-
day from a gentleman in Samoa, who
was formerly a resident of the Ha-
waiian Islands, says that the Ger-
man sloop of war Albatros, and an
English steam yacht, with Lord
Dudley on board, were there when
the Australia passed. Things in
general were very quiet in Samoa.

Hawaii to the kingdom of Samoa.

CHANGES AMONG CAPTAINS.

Captain King has been appointed
General Superintendent of the
Wilder-steamship company. Captain
King makes his last trip on the
steamer Kinau this week, and on
his return next Sunday, will assume
the Superintendency, and remain
ashore. Captain Lorenzen, of the
steamer Likelike, will take command
of the Kinau on her next trip.
Captain Davis, of the steamer Lehua,
takes command of the Likelike to-
day, and Captain T. K. Clark,
formerly a sugar planter at Kipahu-
la, has taken charge of the Lehua.

A HOUSE ON FIRE.

At about 6:45 last night an alarm
of fire was sounded, and notwith-
standing the inclemency of the
weather and the frightful condition
of the streets, people turned out in
full force. The fire was in a small
house just beyond the first bridge
on Nuuanu avenue. It is owned by
Mr. Jas. Campbell, and was occu-
pied by Mr. and Mrs. McMillan and
a lodger. The fire companies
answered the alarm with all possible
haste, but the roads being slippery,
progress was slow. Engine Co. No.
4, being nearest to the fire, was
making good its chance to be there
first, when the boys of Engine Co.
No. 2, with their hose came tearing
along, and were the first to get
water on. No. 4 soon got to work,
also the Pacific Hose Co. The Hook
and Ladder Co. and Engine Co. No.

2 were quickly on the spot. The
fire started in a back bedroom, prob-
ably by a lamp exploding. Mr.
and Mrs. McMillan had gone out to
visit friends, and had left a lamp
burning in the room. The lodger
was also out. Mr. Robert French,
who lives in back of the McMillans,
was about the first to discover the
fire, and after several futile attempts
to give the alarm through the tele-
phone, he gave it up in disgust. Mr.
and Mrs. Carden, who live in the
house just this side of the McMillans,
were among the first to discover the
fire. Mrs. Carden heard a crackling
noise and remarked to her husband
that it sounded like wood burning.
Mr. Carden said it was the rain, but
on getting a whiff of smoke and
seeing the reflection of the blaze
through the window, immediately
went out. He got a garden hose at-
tached to the faucet, but on bursting
open the back door he was forced to
retreat from the flames. Messrs.
Ables, Wagner, Carden and others
managed to effect an entrance and
carry out all available property.
The fire crept from one room to
another and had burnt all but half
the parlor, before it was put out. It
also burnt a hole in the roof and
had it not been for the rain the
house would have been totally de-
stroyed. As it is, the house is about
ruined, and the furniture that was
not burnt was considerably damaged
in other ways.

The house was insured for \$2,500
in the Imperial Insurance of Lon-
don; the furniture for \$1,400 in the
Prussian National Ins. Co. The
latter was divided into two parts,
\$1,000 on McMillan's furniture and
\$400 on Mr. Orderkirk's, the lodger.

CHANGE OF STEAMER TIME.

The New Zealand Herald of the
8th inst contains the following
announcement of change in the time
of departure of the Mail Steamers
from Auckland:—

Commencing with the despatch of
the next month's San Francisco
mail, the steamer will leave Auck-
land a day earlier than now—on
Monday instead of Tuesday. Cor-
respondingly, mails will also close a
day sooner than present dates at all
other places. The change will enable
homeward mails being forwarded from
New York by the Saturday fast boat
for Queenstown, and delivered in
London three or four days earlier
than is now the case.

ILLUSTRATIVE.

A mere accident, on Queen street,
Saturday, added much force to the
illustration of the past and present,
intended to be given in the so-called
historical procession of the day.
After the war canoes of Kamehame-
ha the conqueror, came a wagon,
containing 20 cases of green gin and

Gin" because of its use and in-
fluence in the last Election. Truly this
merely accidental falling in of the
wagon load of gin, marks the pres-
ent only too forcibly.

SUPREME COURT--IN CHAMBERS.

THE MADRAS CASE.

SATURDAY, NOV. 20th.
Before McCully, J.—The Court
heard a motion by plaintiffs in the
case of John Chapman and others
vs. the Hawaiian Government, for
the issuance of a commission to take
the deposition of a witness in a for-
eign country. This action is better
known as the steamship Madras dam-
age case, which is on for trial at the
next January term of the Supreme
Court. It was ordered that a com-
missioner of the Court issue a com-
mission to Herbert Garrett, Junion,
of Manchester, England, to take the
deposition of John Chapman of the
same place. This makes the second
commission issued to the same
gentleman, and is issued on account
of some defect in the answers to the
first interrogations propounded.
Commission issued accordingly, to
be sent by the first outgoing mail.
Hon. S. B. Dole for plaintiff, Wm.
A. Whiting for the Hawaiian Gov-
ernment.

A MORTGAGE CASE.

Before Judd, C. J. John D.
Spreckels and Brothers vs. Geo. W.
Macfarlane. This cause was filed
in the clerk's office at 2 o'clock p.
m., and is a bill in equity praying
for foreclosure of a mortgage and
interest, amounting in the aggregate
to the some of \$47,377.77. As
usual in such cases an injunction
was issued enjoining the defendant
from disposing of the property enu-
merated in the plaintiff's mortgage
until the further order of Court. The
Court appointed Tuesday the 7th
day of December next as the return
day and endorsed its allowance to
the issuance of the usual writs. At
12 minutes before three the Marshal
in person served upon the defendant
copies of the complaint, summons
and injunction. Messrs. F. M.
Hatch and John T. Dare appeared
for plaintiffs.
