The barkentine Ella and the brigantine Claus Spreckels are hourly looked for.
A REPORT of fine weather and smooth sea comes by the steamer Kinau.
The roof of the Roman Catholic Church, Fort street, is being covered with corrugated iron.
CAPTAIN Meyer, master of the barkentine Eureka, is accompanied by his bride this trip.
THAT hole in the Pali road, complained of some time ago, is reported to be still in existence.
Dog fanciers will find a good specimen, less than a year old, at Dodd's stables. The canine belongs to Mr. G. B. Peacock.
HARMONY Lodge will meet on Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Nominations for officers will be the principal business.
THE usual temperance meeting, this evening, in Fowler's yard, under the auspices of the temperance committee of the Y. M. C. A.
No orders have yet been forwarded for electric lights for marine purposes. The Government have evidently taken the matter under advisement.
Five hundred hogs arrived by the barkentine W. H. Dimond, this morning, for Burke & Winston. The weather was very favorable for hogs, only six dying during the passage.

THE bales of wool from Mr. Campbell's ranch, Kahuku, came to Honolulu by the schooner Manuokawai, this morning.
AMONG the large quantity of general merchandise that came by the barkentine Eureka, this morning, were 76,400 bricks for E. B. Thomas.

A POLICEMAN on going aboard of a steamer, this morning, struck his helmet against some protuberance and knocked off the spike. Not very important, but an item nevertheless.

THE weather has been fair at Kahului for the past week. Rain is much needed on the windward side of Maui. There are no vessels at Kahului now. The schooner Anna is daily expected.

HALF of the sand, placed in the bark Pacific for ballast, will be taken out, and about 200 tons of guano, which arrived from the south, by the bark Star of Devon this morning, will be put in instead.
