THE GOVERNMENT GAZETTE.

The Government Gazette announces that official information has been received through M. H. Feer, Consul and Commissioner of France, that it is proposed to hold an International Exposition at Paris, opening on March 6th, 1889, and closing on the 31st of October following.

The Gazette contains a list of the officers of the Kaimiloa, previously announced, but no new appointments.

The Secretary of the Board of Health makes a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the department, which we are unable to notice more fully in this issue.

TAKING THE OATH.

THE KAIMILOA CROWD "SWORN IN."

There was more than the usual excitement around the Pacific Mail wharf this morning, the centre of attraction being the Kaimiloa. The motley crowd divided up into twos and threes, criticizing the ship and her officers. One old sea dog was heard to remark, "She's a pretty kind of a plaything, but it's all right I suppose, the country's rich and can afford it." Another critic ventured to ask, was the country's credit good enough to disburse all expenses this vessel may incur in a foreign port. "For instance, would the butcher and the baker in a port like Sydney, accept the Admiral's draft on the Hawaiian Treasury in settlement of a provision account, or would the whole box and dice have to be brought to the hammer for the benefit of whom it may concern?" These and such like remarks formed the topics of conversation, while the arrival of the Supreme Court official was awaited.

Two longitudinal hollow pieces of iron lay on the wharf, and were objects of curiosity to the beach-combers. One guessed them to be galling guns, while another suggested they were submarine telescopes, which accounted for their being so rusty, but the mystery was finally cleared up by the boatswain informing all enquirers that they were pumps.

A few minutes after 10 o'clock, there was observed to be extra bustle on board the craft. It was apparently caused by the arrival of an officer from the Supreme Court, who attended for the purpose of

"swearing in" captain, officers and crew. The boatswain's mate roared out in a stentorian voice. "Seamen, marines, cooks, boys and bottle-washers, and all who are going to sea in this craft, lay aft and sign articles." The admiral and officers appeared in uniform, and in a few minutes the ceremony was over, the crowd dispersed and the "dead marines" were ejected through the stern port-holes.

THE BRIDAL BELLS.

This morning, Dr. S. Ernest Craddock was united in holy matrimony with Miss Catherine L. Webster, daughter of Mr. W. S. Webster of this city. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. A. Cruzan at the residence of Dr. Craddock's parents on Fort street. This afternoon Dr. Craddock and bride departed for South Kona, Hawaii, by the steamer W. G. Hall.

O LUSO HAWAIIAN.

The Portuguese organ continues to show signs of prosperity and of constant painstaking for the education, instruction and recreation of its readers. The geography of the islands, which will be a thoroughly good work, has now reached the eastern part of Maui, giving on the way, a good deal of information, difficult to obtain. The recreation part is marked by a splendid variety of Madura, in India, by a series of very interesting conundrums, for the guessing of which prizes are offered to the readers, and by columns of amusing stories and items. In the political line, though usually very moderate, as becomes the organ of a nationality who have yet no political status in the country, yet the Luso is clearly on the side of the people, asking for good government and especially for strict justice, the utter incapacity of the country native judges, being the object of a very forcible item, asking for foreign interference. The news department is always full and well selected, and proofs of the rapid progress of the Portuguese colony in these islands, are noted by the announcement of a dancing school in Honolulu, of the foundation of an agricultural colony in Kona, Hawaii, of the building of numerous Portuguese houses and shops in Hilo, etc. The Portuguese Ladies' Charitable Association publishes a first list of names of donations, outside of monthly membership, amounting to more than one hundred dollars, which must be greatly to the satisfaction and credit of the energetic lady who is the soul of that institution, Mrs. Canavaro. Taken all together, the paper is very good and Mr. Marques, the editor of O Luso, may well feel satisfied with the good work he is accomplishing in the line he has undertaken with so much earnestness, and for which he deserves the full support of the community.

RESULTS OF THE TABLEUX AND COMEDY.

The two entertainments recently given in the Hawaiian Opera House, in aid of the British Benevolent Society, not only afforded enjoyment to those who attended, but the financial result to the Society is very satisfactory. The gross proceeds of the first night amounted to \$350.50, and of the second night to \$286.50, which with a donation of \$10 from Messrs. J. E. Brown & Co., aggregate \$647.00. The expenses were \$321.20, leaving a net sum of \$325.80 towards the funds of the British Benevolent Society. This is a very handsome donation—for donation it really is—from those ladies and gentlemen who gratuitously gave their time and talents to get up the entertainments.

A FAST STEAMER PROJECTED.

New York, April 12.—Robert M. Fryer, who was identified with the famous Fryer process, has been busy with incorporating the Arrow Steamship Company. This company will build a steamship which can cross the ocean from Sandy Hook to Queenstown in less than six days. Ground has been purchased at Alexandria, Va., where the proposed ship will be built, and the inventor promises to launch her in November.

ARRIVAL OF QUEEN KAPOLANI AT SAN FRANCISCO.

The Queen and Royal party arrived safely on the morning of the 20th April.

General Dominis would receive no visitors during the day on account of gout, except Commodore Belknap of the United States navy, an old friend of his, whom he has not seen for several years.

A sharp earthquake has been experienced over the whole Island of Jersey. The tremor proceeded from west to east. No damage.

J. H. Bartlett, who acted as first assistant engineer of the Jeannette during that unfortunate vessel's cruise to the Arctic, returned to this city from the East last Thursday and is now stopping with friends here.

Boston, April 23.—Queen Kapolani telegraphs from San Francisco that she will accept the hospitality of the city of Boston, which has been rendered her through the Mayor.

London, April 21.—Gladstone writes that he does not desire another election to Parliament until the English mind is as ripe on the Irish question as the Welsh and Scotch minds are, but that that time is rapidly advancing. "Anyhow," he says, "I am prepared to face anything to defeat coercion. I continue to hope for much from vigorous action on the part of the constituencies whose representatives in Parliament have decisive votes on the issue."

St. Petersburg, April 21.—Russia has issued a 4 per cent internal loan amounting to 10,000,000 roubles.

A traveler returned from Panama reports there is great stagnation of business on the isthmus, owing to the fact that work on the canal has almost stopped. The ravages of smallpox in Jamaica, where most of the men come from, has cut off the supply from that source. The few laborers at work are imported.

THE POPE AND THE IRISH QUESTION.

In consequence of England's treatment of Ireland, and the attitude of the Irish clergy on the Irish question, the Pope has charged Cardinal Simeoni to make thorough inquiry of the whole matter, and draft instructions for Irish Bishops.
