"OTHERWISE EXPRESSED."

Article 44 of the Constitution, as quoted by the Government counsel in his brief, declares "that the legislative power of the kingdom is vested in the King and the Legislature." But the point seems to have been overlooked, that by the interpretation, which the Cabinet put upon Article 48, the King does not cooperate. The veto, sent in by the King only under ministerial sanction, is really an operation of the Cabinet alone. The King is not responsible for this operation. The Ministers advise and prepare the veto, which one of the Ministers countersigns. How can the Cabinet contend that this is co-operation of the King with the Legislature?

"Otherwise expressed," the Cabinet's claim would make Article 44 to mean, the legislative power is vested in the Cabinet and Legislature. But this power gives the Cabinet a double-hold on the Legislature. The check on legislation thus provided is a check on the Legislature, but it is in the hands of the Ministry. These are appointed by the King, outside of the Legislature, not from among the representatives chosen by the people as are the Ministers of the English Crown. These officials, who have first discussed and voted on some measure of public policy, are thus afterwards empowered to annul the action of the Legislature by refusing the royal signature, in this case necessary merely to give notarial validity to any law enacted by the

Legislature. It is the Cabinet, and not the King, which co-operates with the Legislature. But how does this consist with the Attorney-General's idea, that we cannot have "responsible" government unless the King is controlled by the Cabinet, and the Cabinet controlled by the Legislature? What sort of control can the Legislature have over four of its own members, who can annul at their personal will, any vote of the Nobles and Representatives standing 10 to 10?

We "express" again, whether wise or "otherwise," the opinion reiterated again and again in these columns, that a Cabinet, which does not recognize the paramount obligation of its own pledged honor and veracity, gives us a fatally "irresponsible" government. It is more to be feared than a Cabinet, which cannot put a check in the foolish notions and iniquitous misrule of an "irresponsible" Hawaiian.

OBSTRUCTION OF STREETS.

The session laws of 1886 contain an Act to prevent the obstruction of streets, in which hitching horses or mules in any street, unless as prescribed, or permitting them to run loose, is prohibited. This law is fractured daily, either from ignorance or wilfully. We hereunder reproduce the 20th, 21st and 22nd sections, for general information:—

"No person shall hitch or fasten any horse, or other animal, to any ornamental or shade tree in the streets or side-walks, or to any box or frame around such tree. "No person shall leave any horse or mule in any street, lane or alley, unless said horse or mule shall be securely tied or fastened. "No person shall hitch or fasten any horse or animal in such a manner that such horse or animal, or the appliance used for hitching or fastening such horse or animal, shall obstruct the free passage along any side or cross-walk."

TWO FACTS ABOUT COFFEE.

There are two facts which especially encourage efforts in the line of coffee culture. First, there is the fact that coffee has come to be regarded as a necessary of life, and not a mere luxury; and therefore the demand for it is assured. Moreover, the demand constantly increases, and will increase. The use of coffee is not like a mere fashionable custom which becomes popular, flourishes for a while, and then declines and disappears. Like sugar, tea, and many other articles of diet which could be dispensed with without detriment to health coffee has secured a hold on the palate which assures its continued and increasing use. The other fact is, that the old coffee regions in Southern Asia and South America, which have been the main sources of the world's supply, have been for a series of years past and still are gradually lessening their yield, the old trees apparently becoming exhausted. New fields are but slowly taking the place of old ones. Thus while the market enlarges the supply is doubtful. This is not a pleasant outlook for consumers, but it is encouraging to those who contemplate becoming producers on these islands.

LIMPING LOGIC.

The counsel for the Government in the veto case has claimed that the exercise of any personal veto power by the King is unconstitutional. The argument to prove this assertion is that it is inconsistent with other provisions of the Constitution. These all require "the advice and consent of some other responsible body," Cabinet, or Legislature, or Privy Council. Therefore—such is the conclusion of the learned counsel—Article 48 confers no such power.

But this is limping logic. It is assertion, and not argument; for it simply asserts the Government side of the case, without refuting the King's claim. "The legs of the lame are not equal." The counsel's argument is only the claim of the Cabinet, "otherwise expressed." That claim is, that Article 48 gives the King no exceptional power. But that is really the very point in dispute. Granted that all other powers, conferred upon the King, require the co-operation of some other responsible body. The King claims that the veto power, conferred upon him does not require such co-operation. To say that Article 48 does not confer such power, because all other articles in reference to the King's power do require such co-operation, is simply to assert, not prove the Cabinet's side of the point

in dispute. Most people, who understand the force of language, whether they know or do not know the intentions of the persons who formed the Constitution, would say that Article 48 was intended to give the King the veto power exceptionally. This it does in contrast with other provisions of the Constitution, not in antagonism or opposition to them.

The sense of relief, which undoubtedly would be felt by the Community to be assured that there is no possibility under the Constitution of any antagonism between the King and the Cabinet," is as nothing compared to the sense of grief and amazement, which overwhelm every thoughtful right-minded person, who reads and ponders such attempts to prove wrong to be right. It must impair public confidence in men and measures, bolstered up by craft and denial, rather than standing firm on the ground of truth and right.
