ARRIVAL OF THE GAELIC.
514 PASSENGERS FOR THIS PORT.
The S. S. Gaelic, Captain W. G. Pearne, arrived off port at 5:30 o'clock this a. m., with 514 passengers—488 Chinese and 26 Japanese—for Honolulu, and 48 passengers in transit for San Francisco. Among the through passengers are 17 Japs.

The Gaelic sailed from Hongkong March 14, at 3:15 o'clock p. m. Had variable winds to Yokohama, arrived there March 20th, at 7:30 o'clock a. m. During the run between the last two named ports a case of small pox broke out and was landed at the latter place. Sailed from Yokohama for Honolulu March 24th, at 10:55 a. m. Experienced southerly gales and high seas at the first of the voyage, and variable winds when nearing these islands.

The Gaelic has a clean bill of health, and her passengers for this place were landed in quarantine. The Gaelic also has 40 tons of freight for Honolulu, which will be landed and fumigated. After the landing of freight and passengers, the Gaelic will weigh anchor and proceed to San Francisco.

SUPREME COURT—APRIL TERM.
DOLE, J., PRESIDING.
THURSDAY, April 5th.
The Court opened at 10 a. m., when the Attorney-General presented the following indictment:
The King vs. George Summers, larceny in 1st degree. Plea not guilty, and ordered for trial on Monday.

Argument on demurrer in the case of the Collector-General of Customs vs. W. S. Luce, assumpsit for \$10,847.92, was conducted by Mr. Hartwell, one of the counsel for defense.

A SUGGESTION TO MR. CLAUD SPRECKELS.
It is understood that Mr. Claud Spreckels, the Pacific coast sugar king, is looking for a suitable place somewhere in the east where he may erect an extensive refinery and enter into active competition with the sugar trust. If this is true—and we sincerely hope it is true—we respectfully commend to Mr. Spreckels the advisability of establishing his refinery at the neighboring town of Alexandria. Nowhere else on this side of the continent could he find so many conditions favorable to a great manufactory of this kind.

The climate is mild and equable, the facilities for transportation by either river or rail of the very best, labor plentiful and cheap, and rents nominal. We dare say, so far as rent is concerned, that if Mr. Spreckels were to establish his eastern refinery at Alexandria he would have given him all the ground he would want free of cost. But, perhaps, the most important factor in the advantages of Alexandria for this particular purpose is the excellence of the water. This comes from what is known as Cameron run, and is so soft and pure that the local druggists use it instead of distilled water. It is absolutely clear, and is never disturbed by rains and freshets. It is singularly free from all mineral and vegetable matter, and would, therefore, be invaluable in the refining of sugar.

A movement, we understand, has been set on foot to have Mr. Spreckels visit Alexandria. He should do so, and we have no doubt he would be greatly pleased, for this is one of the towns of the country whose advantages as a manufacturing and shipping point have been strangely overlooked. There are indications of the opening up of a new and prosperous era for Alexandria, and it would be a most happy circumstance in its history were so great a capitalist as Mr. Spreckels to establish himself there just at this time.

GOOD-NATURED PEOPLE.
As a general thing original people, people with wills and opinions—in other words, interesting people—are not, I am inclined to believe, of a very easy-going temper. The man who has a mind of his own usually wishes to have his own way, and is therefore not likely to be regarded as in any conspicuous degree pleasant. When it is said of a clergyman, "Oh, he is a very good man," all church-going persons at once get an idea of very dry sermons. (For the conveying of such a compliment as this all the vowels and consonants together are not equal to one left-handed infection.) The most

interesting character in "Milton's Paradise Lost" is unquestionably the arch-demon himself; and in the modern newspaper—epic poems being long out of date—no class of persons, unless it be political candidates, cut a greater figure than the criminals. There is no doubt of it, good nature and even a good character—which things, I comfort myself with hoping, are not exactly the same—do tend to grow somewhat monotonous and tiresome. Human nature is like an apple—all the more palatable for being a trifle tart. No husband and wife ever lived together in greater harmony than did Elia and his cousin Bridger, concerning whom we read, nevertheless: "We agree pretty well in our tastes and habits, yet so as 'with a difference.' We are generally in harmony with occasional bickerings, as it should be among near relations. Our sympathies are rather understood than expressed; and once, upon my dissembling a tone in my voice more kind than ordinary, my cousin burst into tears and complained that I was altered."

A little flavor of individuality and self-will is excellent for preventing insipidity. Thus I theorize. And why not? If a man is fond of his own ease and his own way, always "notional," often out of sorts, and never very amiable, why should he not shape his theory to fit the facts? All the while, however, I am conscious that I could find much to say on the other side. There used to be a funeral hymn (it may have gone out of vogue ere this) beginning, "Sister, thou wast mild and lovely," the word "lovely" being employed, I take it, in the old-fashioned, dictionary sense of lovable, not in the new-fangled, boarding-school sense of beautiful; and I cannot help feeling that mildness, gentleness of spirit, is one of the traits which most people like to attribute to their friends, at least after they are dead. It would sound rather odd and incongruous—would it not?—to sing about the coffin, "Sister, thou wast irascible and interesting." And even in the case of the living, I must confess to a preference for an equable and obliging disposition, especially in a woman. I may be whimsical, but I have never seen many who affected me as uncomfortably sweet-tempered.—[March Atlantic.]
