Ascends Hanging by His Toes to a Trapape!

Aerobitic Performance in the Air!

Do Not Fail to See This Perilous Feat!

A Jump of 5,000 Feet From the Clouds!

Professor MELVILLE, whose success for so young a man has been unprecedented, is a member of the Military Academy of Aeronautical Work, of Menden, France. His father performed some great and daring work during the Siege of Paris. He made four balloon ascensions from Place Caroussel, Paris, and carried 3,000 letters and messages safely through the Prussian lines. When a boy the Professor made his first ascension with his father, who with a committee composed of G. Gambetta, Charcot of the Parisian Press, Duran, the Astronomer of the Observatory of Paris, and General Negrez, started from the Anglaise, in the City of Nice, on the 7th of June and landed on the 16th at Moscow, Russia, traveling 6,000 miles, and at an altitude of 23,000 feet.

Professor Melville has made 700 successful ascensions. He will leap from the Balloon when at an altitude of 5,000 feet and descend to the earth with a Parachute.

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
