MUSICALE.

A FINE ENTERTAINMENT AT OAHU COLLEGE.

A musicale at Oahu College is always sure to attract a large audience. Such was the case last night. An excellent programme had been arranged by Mr. A. D. Bissell, musical instructor at the College, and the various numbers met with much approval.

The programme opened with a chorus "The Stars in Heaven" delightfully sung by Mr. Bissell's choral society, Mr. Myron Jones accompanying on the piano. Miss S. R. Patch next sang Sullivan's song "Orpheus and his Lute" with much taste and expression. The accompaniment was played by that accomplished musician, Miss Carrie Castle, the first time we have heard a note from her since returning from Europe. Mr. Bissell played an air with variations by Pabst on the piano, with considerable delicacy and feeling. The first part of the programme was brought to a close by Mr. C. Booth singing "Longing" by Rubenstein. It was well rendered, though towards the end the singer was a little out of tune.

Part two opened with Haydn's Trio No. 4 played by Dr. F. R. Day violin, J. F. Brown violoncello, and Myron H. Jones piano. This kind of music is very enjoyable, and on this occasion the gentlemen above named gave a very fine rendition of Haydn's classical though effective music. Later in the evening they gave a Largo by Beethoven with much taste and skill. The ensemble was exceedingly good. It is to be hoped these gentlemen will make their appearances in public a little more frequent in the future. A song, "Oh, doubting heart," was charmingly rendered by Miss von Holt, who played her own accompaniment. Miss Patch and Mr. Bissell gave the Larghetto from Beethoven's symphony in D as a piano duet with considerable skill. Sullivan's effective song "The Lost Chord" was given a faultless interpretation by Miss Mabel Rhodes, her lower tones coming out rich and full. The musicale terminated with a chorus by the choral society, well sung.
