QUARANTINE STATION.

THE IMPROVEMENTS MADE BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

This morning, in company with Dr. N. B. Emerson, President of the Board of Health, a representative of the BULLETIN paid a visit to the Quarantine grounds at Mauiola. Crossing the harbor in a small boat the jetty is reached, and then there is a walk of over a quarter mile on a pier about six feet wide before the grounds are reached.

Heretofore it had been a matter of difficulty in getting around the grounds owing to there being no paths. This has been remedied by the building up of embankments so that you can move from one building to another without any trouble whatever. The fumigating house has been thoroughly renovated.

The most attractive building on the ground is that known as "quarantine hotel." It stands alone in a splendid position, and has a wide veranda running the whole length both back and front.
