A NATIVE boy threw a stone and hit the handsome closed car that runs to Kamehameha schools. The blow crushed in the boarding on the end of the car; if it had hit anybody the result would have been serious.

DURING the conspiracy trial yesterday one of the witnesses spoke of the feast at Mrs. Dominis' residence. Mr. Neumann asked him if it was a feast of reason. A wag in court was overheard to say that it might have been a feast of (reason).

UNDER instructions from the Grand Lodge, the local Odd Fellows will hold a memorial service (elsewhere advertised) at Harmony Hall on Sunday afternoon next. Departed Odd Fellows will be remembered in the ceremonies for their virtues.

COMPANY B, at drill yesterday evening, had the pleasure of a visit from Mr. Chas. H. Barth, pay clerk U. S. M. H. M. who found in Capt. Fisher an old friend and fellow-member of Co. B (City Guard), 1st Inf. Reg. National Guard California, whom he had not seen for more than twelve years.

OCTOBER TERM.

Trial of Ho Fon for Conspiracy-- Before His Honor the Chief Justice.

TUESDAY, Oct. 15th.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Court resumed at 1 o'clock. Robert N. Boyd was further examined. He stated Wilcox gave him \$10 on two occasions with which he bought from Dr. Brodie a Springfield and a Sharp rifle. Wilcox said he got the money from Ho Fon. He had seen Wilcox and Ho Fon in company talking outside of Ho Fon's office before and after I had seen Ho Fon at the meetings. On the Saturday before the 29th Wilcox told me he had nothing to eat and would have to go to the Chinaman and get some money. We came down town and Wilcox stepped into Ho Fon's office. He came out directly afterwards and had money with him. It was in silver; he bought some bread. I saw Ho Fon on the evening of the 29th about 12 o'clock in the Princess' dining room. He was not armed. Papu, the Chinaman, had a gun and belt of cartridges on the night of the 29th. I saw Papu bring provisions in the palace yard on the 30th. It was about two hours before the firing commenced. He brought watermelons in an express driven by a Chinaman.

Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann--Saw Ho Fon talking to Wilcox on the night of the 10th. I was a schoolmate of Ho Fon's. Did not have any conversation with him about the revolution. Did not see Ho Fon swear to the oath. He did not deliver any speech on the night of the 29th. Wilcox told me on several occasions he was having money supplied him by Ho Fon. He said in his office that the Chinese were furnishing him money to carry out his project. I bought the Springfield rifle first, the Sharp afterwards. The money I paid for the rifles, Wilcox said he had got from Ho Fon.

George Markham sworn, stated--I know Ho Fon, the defendant. Have known him eight years. Since

the organization of the Liberal Patriotic Association have known him quite intimately. It was a secret association. Ho Fon was present at the meeting at the Princess' residence on July 10th. Did not hear him say anything or see him take the oath. Saw him at the meeting on the 11th. Should think a person would know the object of the meetings after being there and hearing the discussion. Think I had some talk down town with Ho Fon about the project. I met Ho Fon at his office on the 29th. Wilcox sent me there for some spirits. It was a case of gin. I told him the natives wanted some gin that night before they marched down. He told me to go in the evening. I did, but there was no gin. I found Ho Fon later at the Princess' residence. I asked him where the gin was, and he said he did not think it a good thing for the natives to have any. Some of them he said had been too boozed at the first meeting. I asked Ho Fon for some change to pay for a hack. I used the hack for gathering in rice bird guns and for fetching the gin. I got the rice bird guns from Chinese business houses. Ho Fon gave me the change, it was \$1.25 or \$1.50. The driver of the hack was a native. Saw Papu, the Chinaman, bring provisions into the palace yard in a Chinese hack--a box of bread, a keg of salmon and other things.

Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann--Boyd told me that if we turned state's evidence we would get off. Have made a statement to the Attorney-General which was taken down by a shorthand writer.

Jack Kuamoo sworn, stated--I know the defendant, do not know his name. I was invited to a luau at Princess Liliuokalani's residence, saw some haole and the defendant there. Saw him in the diningroom, some of the men in there were speech making. When I got there the meeting was over. I took the oath that night, the defendant was near the door when I was sworn. I thought it was the Kamehameha Rifle Association I was joining.

W. H. Cummings sworn, stated--I reside in Honolulu. Was here in July. Know Wilcox and the defendant. Know Princess Liliuokalani's residence, was there on the night of July 10th. Was invited there by Wilcox to a feast. I saw Ho Fon, Markham, Boyd, Poepeo, Spencer and others I am not acquainted with. I was sitting on the veranda with Testa and Poepeo when Wilcox came out dressed in uniform. He was excited. I did not take any oath, because I did not approve of the whole movement. Ho Fon was in the dining-room where Wilcox was.

Cross-examined--The defendant did not take any part in the discussion. They kept the meeting up until four o'clock next morning. I was placed under guard after I refused to take the oath, so was Testa. David Croningberg sworn, stated--I was living in Honolulu in July last. Know Wilcox. I was invited by Thos. Spencer to attend a lunch on July 10th, at Princess Liliuokalani's residence. Markham was with him. When I got there I noticed Kaiue, Boyd, Wilcox, Poepeo, Testa, Malulani, Cummings, and three foreigners. They were in the diningroom. I know the defendant. Wilcox introduced him to me, and told me that the defendant was a good man, and a Chinaman's agent. Wilcox afterwards explained to me the object of their meeting. When I heard what he said I tried to get away but was stopped by a haole with a bayonet. Do not think I took an oath.

David Kaapa sworn, stated--I know Ho Fon. I was invited to a luau on July 29th at Mrs. Dominis' and went. Wilcox was there and asked me to take the oath and I did so. I saw Ho Fon after that. I heard Ho Fon say to Wilcox, "You want a good government ain't you." I saw Ho Fon again about 9 o'clock on the morning of July 30th. Saw Papu in a carriage on Hotel street, a Chinaman driving. I saw a Chinaman bring something out of the store No. 39 Hotel street, and place it in the carriage. I was with my wife, and told her I was going in that store, as I knew Ho Fon was there. When I saw him he told me he had just sent some poi and meat and plenty of food to the palace. At 5 o'clock the Court adjourned to 9:30 Wednesday morning.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 16.

The Court opened at 9:30 a. m. David Kaapa was cross-examined as follows--I was formerly a police officer. Not doing anything now. Was on the police force a year and two months, was dismissed by the Marshal. Do not know the reason. First knew of the movement on the night of July 29th. Kahanani came that evening to my house and invited me to go to hear speeches at Palama, and also attend a luau. Had never spoken to Wilcox or Markham before on the matter. Wilcox administered the oath to me and others, were sworn in a crowd. Had conversation with Ho Fon on the veranda. After that did not see him again. Have known Papu the Chinaman since 1886. He was dressed in a red shirt and cap, and carried a gun and cartridges. I got away between three and four o'clock in the morning. On the morning of July 30th I left my mother's house in company with my wife between 8 and 9 o'clock. Was going to my house on Merchant street. I know where Kwong Hip Lung's store is. The hack I noticed was standing in

front of that store. I first saw the hack following Ho Fon. Did not see the front part of the hack. Papu was in the back seat of the hack. Ho had a checkered suit on. Did not see his face. Knew him by the back of his head. His tail was not hanging down. Saw the hack move from the store and go along Hotel street. Did not follow it up. My wife and I walked up to the store, and I saw Ho Fon inside near the counter. Ho Fon said, "Hello Dave," and that he had just sent something to eat for Wilcox. Said he had sent poi, beef, salmon, bread and crackers. There was a Chinaman behind the counter. I walked out and told my wife, "It's so, that hack we saw drove up has taken provisions to the palace for Wilcox." I gave myself up because I thought I was wrong in going to the meeting, and Poepeo had given my name away. I did tell the Attorney-General about Papu before I gave testimony.

Mrs. D. Kaapa sworn, stated--Am wife of David Kaapa. On morning of July 30th between 8 and 9 o'clock we left my mother's house. My attention was called to a Chinese hack which stopped in front of a store on Hotel street. I saw a number of articles brought out of the store and put into the hack. I noticed as I thought a Chinaman in the hack which drove off going towards the palace. We walked to the store and my husband entered the store. It is No. 39 Hotel street. I saw Ho Fon in the store talking with my husband.

Cross-examined--Had never seen the defendant before that morning. Only saw another Chinaman in the store besides Ho Fon.

H. P. K. Malulani sworn, stated--I know R. W. Wilcox, knew of a revolutionary movement. Was a member of the Kamehameha Rifle Association. Know the residence of Princess Liliuokalani at Palama. Was there in July. I attended two meetings there on the nights of the 10th and 11th of July. On the 10th saw Wilcox, Ho Fon, three foreigners, Poepeo, Testa, Spencer, Kauhane, Cummings, Kuamoo, there. A meeting was held in the dining-room. In another room there was a keg of wine and I was a kind of waiter. Did not listen closely to the conversation, or hear the object of the meeting. Afterwards I was called in to take the oath. I asked Wilcox for some particulars. He said it was for a good object, the King was debased and low down, and he proposed to raise him up. I took the oath. Think it was a secret affair, because guards were placed. Ho Fon was there sitting on a good chair in the dining room. I did not have any conversation with Ho Fon that evening, did not hear him say anything. I saw Ho Fon holding his hand up same as the rest of us. Wilcox was talking at the time, saying something about the hui. Do not know whether Wilcox spoke in English or Hawaiian. I am not a wine drinking man. I left there some time after the cock crew. Saw Ho Fon on the night of the 11th at the same place.

(At this point His Honor said that the witness under arrest and as yet had not been instructed that anything he might say might be used against him. After a remark from the Attorney-General, who said the witness had not been yet indicted, the Court gave the necessary caution to the witness.) Examination of witness continued--On the night of the 29th instead of going to the meeting in the dining room was in a house in another part of the premises. Was sent there by Boyd and Markham to guard some arms. Did not see Ho Fon that night. I was one of the party that went to the palace. On arrival at the mauka gate there was a call for Kuamoo, probably because he knew the pass word. I climbed over the gate, others came after me and opened it. When the cannon were first fired I was sitting on a bread box, was in charge of the provisions. I was one of the thirty who surrendered.

Cross-examined--Am studying in a lawyer's office. Do not remember the first man who was sworn on the 10th. Testa refused to take the oath and he and Wilcox quarrelled. I saw Ho Fon holding up his hand, while Wilcox was talking. He was the only Chinaman there on the 10th. Saw others on the 11th. Did not see any guns or bayonets when I was sworn.

By a juror--Did not see the provisions brought in the palace yard that I had charge of. By the Court--There were four boxes of bread. I was excited. By Mr. Neumann--A charge of treason stands against me. Was first charged with conspiracy. J. M. Poepeo sworn, stated--I have a full license to practice law. My office is on King street near the Chinese News office. Have known the defendant about a year, as a newspaper man, connected with the Chinese News. Don't know whether he is the editor. I pleaded guilty to conspiracy. Had several conversations with Ho Fon during July, with regard to private business and the conspiracy. A few days before the conspiracy he asked me when the movement was going to be made, meaning the movement from Palama to the Palace. I told him I did not know. One or two days after he came in and said if the movement went along so slowly it would leak out. He referred I think to the insurrection. Nothing else was said. Did not know myself when the movement would be made. I attended three meetings at Palama.

The first night I saw Ho Fon there, he came after me. He was there the second night. Cannot say whether he was present at the third. The dates of the three meetings are July 10th, 11th and 29th.

Cross-examined--Was there on night of July 10th, saw others, including Wilcox and Boyd. Ho Fon arrived half-an-hour after me. I talked with Testa and Cummings. Ho Fon did not talk. I took the oath, and the reason is that I saw Boyd with a pistol and Markham with a gun, and it looked like compulsion because I had been taken for a spy. I thought they might do me harm if I did not take the oath. I once gave something away in 1887. Malulani took the oath, he is a peculiar fellow, would not take a drink. Ho Fon was eating cakes and crackers. Did not see him sworn. On the 11th I saw Ho Fon there. Did not see Wilcox and Ho Fon converse together on the 10th. Was there on the 29th, saw two Chinese there. I went to the palace, a Chinaman was with us. I never spoke to Ho Fon about the object of the hui. I pleaded guilty to the charge of conspiracy. Was not told I should be required to give testimony. My attorney advised me. Was two months and six days in jail. Did not practise law there. At 12:15 the Court took a recess.
