The British bark Flying Venus, of Liverpool, England, commanded and owned by Mr. John Kerr, sailed from Puget Sound July 18th for Melbourne and was wrecked on a sunken reef off Penrhyn Island on Sept. 6th. All hands landed safely in the boats, and a boat's crew of seven men started for Samoa on Oct. 5th, arriving off the islands on the 13th, after sailing 846 miles. Col. de Coetlogon, the British Consul at Apia, despatched the schooner Daisy for Penrhyn a few days later to bring off the remainder of the shipwrecked crew.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

An Important Meeting-Introduction of a Skilled Specialist in Leprosy

An important meeting of the Board of Health was held this morning. Mr. T. E. Evans, late Deputy Sheriff of Lahaina, Maui, signified his acceptance of the position of Resident Superintendent of the Leper Settlements of Kalaupapa and Kalaupao, Molokai. He will take his place there on the 1st of January, and will work in connection with Mr. R. W. Meyer, General Superintendent, and have particular care of details at the settlements.

The Board were very glad at this meeting to welcome Dr. Lutz, a pupil of Dr. Unna of Hamburg, Germany, whose fame as a specialist in skin diseases has reached these islands. They had been in correspondence with both Dr. Unna and Dr. Lutz for a year past, the result of which is that the latter arrived by the steamer Australia last week, to enter the service of the Board. He will visit the Molokai settlements during the coming week and thoroughly acquaint himself with their requirements, also at the earliest time possible familiarize himself with the branch hospital at Kalihikai near this city, afterward entering upon his sanitary mission among the lepers of the kingdom. Dr. Lutz has brought with him instruments, many valuable treatises, and medicines. He made a few remarks before the Board on some requisites to his practice, in the way of buildings and animals for experimental purposes, so that he might begin operations with all the scientific facilities that his methods demand. The Board are much encouraged, after their efforts of the past year, in having the desired specialist on the spot ready to begin efforts for the cure of the country's great plague.

A committee of five physicians, to act with the President of the Board. Dr. Emerson, was appointed, for the purpose of investigating the reported cases of acute croup in town, so as to become perfectly acquainted with the nature of the malady. The committee are Drs. Kimball, Brodie, Trousseau, Day and Wood. Dr. Emerson leaves for Kauai during the week in company with Drs. Smith and Campbell, to report upon two cases of leprosy that Dr. Knudsen has had permission to treat for the past few months.

The Bishop Home under the able management of the Catholic Sisters on Molokai has now over eighty inmates of all ages, and reports are that it is being very happily conducted and doing much good. The Boys' Home is under the same charge and has had a cottage erected on the ground for the special use of the Sisters.

DEATH OF CAPT. NICOLLS.

It is with much regret that we announce the death of Capt. Jasper E. T. Nicolls of H. B. M. S. Cormorant, which took place October 9th, at sea, between Bahia and St. Vincent. The vessel touched somewhere and called the news to England, as the sad event appeared in the Admiralty Gazette, a copy of which is on board the Espiegle. The Cormorant, which left Honolulu May 22d, arrived at Coquimbo August 20th. Under that date Chief Engineer Harding wrote to a member of the Bulletin staff that they hoped to be in England within twelve weeks. He also enclosed some photos taken by Capt. Nicolls at Tahiti.

The deceased Captain had many warm friends in Honolulu who will deeply regret his death in the prime of life, and much sympathy will be expressed for Mrs. Nicolls and her two young children. At St. Andrew's Cathedral Sunday morning at the service of the second congregation, the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh alluded very feelingly to the death of Capt. Nicolls. During the stay of the vessel in port the lamented Captain attended these services quite regularly. The hymns "Thy will be done" and "Days and moments are quickly flying" were sung by the choir and Mr. Wray Taylor played a march funeral by Mendelssohn at the close of the service.

R. M. S. ZEALANDIA.

The R. M. S. Zealandia arrived from the Colonies Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. She sailed from Sydney October 30th at 4 p. m., arrived at Auckland November 31 at noon. Left the latter port on the 4th at 2 p. m. Passed the Alameda on the 6th at 4:40 p. m., touched off Tutuila the 9th at 3:10 a. m. From October 30th to November 4th experienced fine clear weather and light variable winds. From the 4th to 7th strong northerly winds and heavy head seas, 8th to 14th light northerly winds and fine weather, thence to port strong head winds and seas. The Zealandia brought 4 cabin and 1 steerage passengers and 12 tons of freight for this port, and had in transit for San Francisco 45 cabin and 54 steerage passengers and 237 tons of freight. She sailed for San Francisco shortly after 8 o'clock Saturday evening.

OAHU RAILWAY OPENING.

Great and Gay Event-Eleven Excursions-Enjoyed by Everybody.

Mr. B. F. Dillingham, projector of the Oahu Railway & Land Company, and contractor for building their railway, introduced a new and improved style of railway opening in the inauguration of the completed portion of the Pearl Harbor Division on Saturday last, the 16th inst. The custom elsewhere is to fill up excursion trains with dignitaries of state, politicians, and railway and newspaper men, run to a terminal or central point, and there entertain the distinguished excursionists at a banquet, where champagne and congratulations are uncorked together. Mr. Dillingham's more democratic and better way was to give a series of free, popular excursions extending over the whole day, calling into service for that purpose the entire passenger rolling stock of the road.

The handsome but not quite completed city terminal station at Iwilei was decorated with the Hawaiian, American and O. R. & L. Co.'s flags, floating respectively from the three towers, that of the corporation being in the middle. The last consists of three horizontal strips of red, blue and red, with the company's seal in the middle, making the whole a striking and tasteful design. Before the initial train pulled out from the station at 7 a. m., the platforms were crowded with people of all ages, sexes and nationalities, and this condition obtained all day. Still the arrangements were so thorough that there was no confusion either in embarking or disembarking of the thousands who had admission to the round trips by tickets marked with the hour for each. Eleven trains were despatched to Halawa on the shore of Pearl Harbor and returned during the day without the slightest accident or impediment. The number of tickets issued was 3,300, but over four thousand people travelled over the road, as, to prevent disappointment to several hundreds of too late applicants for tickets, a little judicious packing on some of the afternoon trains procured accommodation for the surplus above indicated. Mr. Dillingham, Mr. W. G. Ashley, the company's secretary, and Mr. Jennings, superintendent of the line, gave their personal attention throughout to the carrying out of the arrangements, to which is due the highly satisfactory results of the inaugural celebration.

The passenger engine "Kaala," with Mr. Clark as engineer, took the first train, of which Mr. John Coakley was conductor. The second train was drawn by the contractor's working engine, operated by Mr. Kent, and Mr. La Pierre was its conductor. The passenger engine "Leali," driven by Mr. Roberts, was run in conjunction with its sister locomotive, sometimes drawing and again running as a pilot engine. Those who rode in the first-class cars, especially, were delighted with the smoothness of the motion. On some of the straighter levels of the road a lively speed was reached—particularly on a certain two-mile stretch, where from thirty to forty miles an hour is claimed to have been the pace. Passengers in some cases amused their fellow-excursionists by calling out the suppositious stations, also doing the train-boy act of hawking imaginary newspapers and refreshments. Mr. A. F. Cooke gave a generous tone of reality to his impersonation of this character, by distributing a basket of luscious green grapes amongst a number of children on one of the cars.

PERSONAL.

Among the arrivals by the Australia were Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Dimond of San Francisco. Mr. Dimond is son of Gen. W. H. Dimond of the firm of Williams, Dimond & Co. Mrs. Dimond is sister of Mrs. A. G. Dana, who is daughter-in-law to Professor Dana so well and favorably known on the Islands. As Mr. Dimond is to be admitted to the firm of Williams, Dimond & Co. on the first of January, it will doubtless be pleasant for him to become acquainted with members of the business houses in Honolulu, with whom he hopes to do business. Mr. and Mrs. Dimond will take the trip to the volcano, before returning to San Francisco.


