A NATURAL RESULT.

"From outside people, however, it is learned that, in view of the fact that the liquor traffic assuming such great proportions in Alaska, Captain Knowles, the President of Pacific Steam Whaling Company, has issued peremptory instructions to all the company's captains not to call at Honolulu. Once they leave this port the whalers are to proceed direct to the whaling cruise, and are to stop at no point where a stock of liquor could be laid in. The company has always been opposed to liquor traffic, but it has been asserted and never denied that every whaler that went into the Arctic during the past season was well stocked with rum and whisky, which they secured at Honolulu. The liquor is used for trading purposes with the Indians, and it is said that the whalers always fare well by the bargain. An immense quantity of the vile stuff was taken to the Arctic last year, but as the Indians had very little to sell, there was not much market for the rum this time. As the rum could not be got rid of in barter and as the whalers could not bring it back into port it was handed over to the Indian chiefs, who are to act as agents for the captains of whalers and dole the liquor out to the Esquimaux in exchange for bear, fox and deer skins. In fact it is estimated that when the whalers left the Arctic they left 5000 gallons of the worst spirits ever distilled to be disposed of in this manner.—S. F. Alta, Nov. 22, 1890."
