AN HISTORICAL ESSAY BY MR. HUNTSMAN.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—On the Island of Hawaii there reigns a prince of the royal line of blue-bellied Yankees who came to this country to preach the gospel and acquire valuables in early times.

Mr. Hitchcock of Hilo has for several years been conducting a small but profitable reign of terror within his jurisdiction. Many of his victims have protested more or less loudly according to their ability.

Most of them have been speedily silenced in the grave or in jail. When I went to Hilo district as a Government teacher I was soon assaulted by a mob led by a cousin of the sheriff, and afterward taken into his court and officially knocked down and walked over more or less.

Afterward, when I had the temerity to attempt to practice law I was assaulted by hired ruffians and subjected to a series of persecutions that compelled me to seek refuge in Honolulu.

When I arrived in Honolulu I laid the matter before the Attorney-General and Marshal, offering indisputable evidence of the charges I made. The Attorney-General thereupon opined that Hitchcock was the best sheriff they ever had in that part of the country.

But the Marshal investigated the facts and finding them as represented requested Mr. Hitchcock to resign from the service he had disgraced. The Marshal's action was most honest and laudable, but he reckoned without the kin.

When the kin heard that a beloved member of their family circle was about to be choked off from the Government seat where all good missionaries have a divine right to fatten, they rose as a man to save him.

The wires were hot from excessive pulling. Influence electrified the air. The Marshal was told from all sides that he mustn't do it; but he was firm in his resolution.

To rightly understand the situation it must be remembered that the Supreme Court has the right under the Constitution to remove the Marshal, a cunning provision made by the Reform, as has also the Cabinet.

At last the decree came from on high that the Marshal might be removed, but Hitchcock never. The Marshal seems then to have given up the attempt to have an honest administration, but he did not escape the retribution of his folly.

He became responsible for all the corrupt officials under him without the power of removing or controlling them. They steal and dissipate with a gay and festive swagger and defy the Marshal who must bear the odium.

Now Mr. Hitchcock's brothers-in-law by the name of Castle own and edit a newspaper in Honolulu here, and they have never forgiven the Marshal for having had the audacity to act against one of their kinsmen.

It looks as if they had sworn a big oath to be his ruin. It was the Advertiser that made the most of the "Barefooted Bill" conspiracy, and of every mistake or fault of the police, down to the latest Douglas-Bloom affair.

I have no occasion to defend Marshal Wilson. The fact is that if they had been fully identified and their guilt proven there is no law or right to arrest or detain them in this country.

The missionaries would have run them to earth, law or no law—such is their zeal against evil.

Now comes this delectable Advertiser and wants to raise a mass meeting to have the Marshal removed; wants to have the Liberal Party cooperate to get a crowd to cry "down with him." The Liberal Party will not mass on any such proposition.

If the government is unpopular it is due to the fact that all the Reform boodlers are still running the government. The Queen herself is under a cloud with her native subjects because she is made to appear to sustain these same barnacles.
