

WEST MAUI NOTES.

Waialua Court News—Parson's News—Kahului News—Hilo News—Etc.

The Circuit Court for the Second Judicial District reconvened at Waialua, Monday, June 20, at 9:30 a. m. The first case called was Crown vs. Otsuka and Masuda, (Japs.) Murder. Committed from Lahaina for the shooting of a fellow-countryman at Olowalu a few weeks ago. The evidence of the guilt of the defendants was so direct, the jury had no difficulty in finding a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, and the prisoners were remanded to jail to await sentence, which will probably be passed upon them Saturday next.

June 21.—The next case called was also for murder of Japanese, that of the Crown vs. Oto Yersugo and Kagao Saehui. Committed from Waialua. Continued from December term. The defendants were charged with the killing of a fellow Japanese and secreting the body of the murdered man in a cistern on the Waialua plantation, the water of which was in daily use for drinking and household purposes. Upon the decomposition of the body the water became so impure an examination of the cistern was made to ascertain the cause, when the body was discovered, and the defendants were afterwards arrested at Honolulu. The Crown failed to secure sufficient evidence to convict the prisoners, so the jury found them not guilty and they were discharged.

The case of the Crown vs. Lau Kin Chow, et al., for arson, continued from December term, was dismissed by the Court in Banco at Honolulu.

Crown vs. Kong Fat. (Ch.) Assault to commit rape. Committed from Makawao. Verdict of guilty and the prisoner was sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for one year and to pay a fine of \$10.

Crown vs. Kue Lok (Ch.) House breaking. Committed from Waialua. Defendant found guilty and sentenced to two years imprisonment with Court costs added.

Crown vs. Joe Tokuboi (S. S. I.) Committed by Circuit Judge. Assault to murder. A change of venue to July term, Honolulu, was granted.

June 22.—The Crown vs. Abona (Ch.). Rape. Committed by Circuit Judge. Nolle prosequi was entered by the Crown. This is the case of the little girl, a pupil for 10 days only of the Government school at Waiehe, she having been expelled from the Waialua school for immoral conduct. She testified exactly contrary to her evidence in the lower Court.

June 23.—The Crown vs. Nukula (S. S. I.) Assault to rape. Verdict of not guilty.

The Crown vs. Akana (Ch.) Malicious injury, on appeal from Waialua. Appeal withdrawn.

June 24.—The foreign jury civil causes. Joe Fernandez vs. Antonio Borba. Trover. Continued from December term. Appeal dismissed.

S. Ah Mi vs. Waiehe Sugar Co. Trover. Continued from December term. Agreement that the case be heard in Honolulu by Judge Bickerton.

A. Gorman vs. Manuel Borba. Assumpsit. Appeal from Waialua. Jury waived. Judgment for defendant.

John de Costa vs. W. F. Pogue. Illegal impounding. Appeal from Makawao. Jury waived, and judgment for defendant entered.

Paia Sugar Co. agents Board of Immigration, vs. Katimoto (Jap.) Appeal from Makawao. Jury waived. Case dismissed as not coming under Sec. 1420 Civil Code.

Robert English vs. H. Swift. Damages. Appeal from Makawao. Jury waived. Verdict for plaintiff for \$25.

Mrs. K. Kruger, et al., vs. Halsey. Ejectment. Continued from December term. Case continued to Honolulu before the Chief Justice.

June 25.—Crown vs. Otsuka and Masuda. Murder. Committed from Lahaina for murder of a Japanese at Olowalu. The prisoners were brought before the Court for sentence. Otsuka and Masuda, when asked if they had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon them, both pleaded entire innocence of the crime as charged, whereupon Judge Bickerton, in his kindly manner, went briefly over the evidence in the case, reaching the verdict of the jury of guilty of murder in the first degree, for which the law required their lives. The judge earnestly advised the prisoners to pass the brief remaining day of life in preparing themselves for their meeting with God. The prisoners were then addressed individually, and Masuda first, and then Otsuka, received the awful sentence of death amid the hush of the entire assembly standing. The solemn stillness was broken by the sobbing and weeping of the prisoners. After sentence they were removed to their cells, from whence they will be taken to the prison at Oahu, where they will be confined until the 12th day of September, 1892, when they will be taken out between the hours of 8 o'clock in the morning and 12 o'clock noon and hanged by the neck until dead.

At eleven o'clock, the Court having finished all business, adjourned sine die.

Your correspondent had a conversation with Judge Bickerton in reference to the above murder case. The judge said there was not the slightest doubt of the guilt of the defendants. They offered no defense at all. They could not give any reason for borrowing the revolver with which the shooting was done, nor could they account for the borrowing of the shovels with which they dug the two holes in which the body of the murdered Japanese was placed—the first hole proving too shallow, owing to the fact that they struck a rock, ne-

cessitating another location for the grave of their victim, which also proved too shallow to hide their awful crime of cold-blooded murder.

Thus ends the longest and most important term of the Second Judicial Circuit Court.

At public auction at the courthouse, Waialua, Governor Thos. Everett offered for sale 216,100 acres land in Puhala, District of Waialua, belonging to the estate of Antonio Borba, bankrupt. The land was subject to a mortgage of \$1000 with accrued interest of \$10. Mr. Augustine Enos bid \$1050, and as no other bids were offered the property was withdrawn, as some \$1350 had been offered at private sale.

Capt. Jacobsen brings the latest news from the United States, to the effect that Benj. Harrison was re-nominated by the Republican Convention at Minneapolis, Minn., for President of the United States, James G. Blaine falling short by 17 votes on the third ballot.

Mr. Chas. H. Dickey of Haiku has been appointed Tax Assessor and Collector for the Islands of Maui, Molokai and Lanai, as successor to Mr. H. G. Treadway, recently appointed Sheriff. The appointment of Mr. Dickey is approved by the community at large, and there is no doubt in the minds of any who are acquainted with the ability of the gentleman that the duties of the office will be faithfully and conscientiously performed to the entire satisfaction of the public and credit to himself.

The closing exercises of the East Maui Female Seminary were held last Wednesday, June 22, and were largely attended. The exercises showed careful painstaking on the part of the able teachers in charge and reflected great credit upon the young lady pupils.

The young ladies of East Maui Female Seminary, with friends and teachers, had a very enjoyable picnic on the picturesque Iao Valley, Friday.

Weather very warm and dry. Public health very good.

I am informed by Mr. C. H. Broad, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Maui Racing Association, that all races as published are filled, and we anticipate the best day's sport we have ever had and hope to see all our Honolulu friends.

Your correspondent just had conversation with Capt. Jacobsen of the brigantine Consuelo, just arrived from San Francisco, who reports a serious split in the Democratic party, making Cleveland's chances for the nomination very slim. This he says is from the Democratic papers the day he left America.
