NOTICE TO MARINERS.

During the process of deepening the channel at the entrance to Honolulu harbor the Dredger will be in operation night and day. At night there will be a danger signal placed on the forward deck of Dredger about 30 feet above sea level, which can be seen by all vessels approaching the harbor. The signal consists of Red Red of three red lights and a white light as in the diagram, the red lights being about 3 feet apart with the white light in the center.

All steamers crossing the bar will stop at a safe distance from the Dredger and give one blast of their whistle which will be answered by a single blast from the Dredger, to be followed by three blasts from the Dredger when the passage is clear and they can proceed.

The Tug will be on hand when not otherwise engaged to assist sailing craft in passing the Dredger when necessary.

ANNEXATION.

Return of the Champion After Taking Johnston Island for Queen Victoria.

H. B. M. S. Champion left port on July 13 for Johnston Island, in latitude 16 deg. 15 min. N, longitude 163 deg. 30 min. W., and anchored off the island on July 18. The island was annexed the next day. Johnston Island consists of two islands connected by a large coral reef and sandy bank. The place is honey-combed and literally covered with bird's nests, millions of birds making the island their home. Four huts were found, the remains no doubt of some old guano company.

On the western end of the island was found gear from a wreck and inscribed on a prominent position was the following: "Jacob A. Howland, lost on the western reef of this island, Dec. 26, 4 a. m. All hands saved. There is a bark in sight, supposed to be the Abraham Barker, Dec. 28, 1888. We landed on the northwestern side of this island."

On the beach were found a whaleboat in a dilapidated condition, paddles, boat hooks, casks, medicine chest, tinmel stuff and other provisions, mostly old and perfectly useless. The island is surrounded by coral reefs and it is very difficult to effect a landing. There are no trees on the island but an abundance of guano. A copy of the following proclamation was left in a secure place on the island:

PROCLAMATION.

In the name of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India: By Eustace Rooke, Esquire, Captain in the Royal Navy, Commanding Her Britannic Majesty's Ship "Champion."

Whereas, I have it in command from Her Majesty Queen Victoria, through her Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, to assert the sovereign rights of Her Majesty over the group of islands, known as the Johnston Islands, the same having been taken possession of by Her Majesty.

Now therefore I, Eustace Rooke, Esquire, Captain in the Royal Navy, commanding Her Britannic Majesty's Ship "Champion," do hereby declare and proclaim to all men that from and after the date of these presents, the full sovereignty of the Johnston Islands, situated in latitude 16° 15' North, Longitude 163° 30' West, vests in Her Majesty Queen Victoria, her heirs and successors for ever.

Given under my hand at Johnston Islands, this nineteenth day of July, 1892. EUSTACE ROOKE, Captain of H. B. M. Ship "Champion."

It is not definitely known what Great Britain intends doing with these coral reefs, but there is some talk that the island will be utilized as a resting place for a cable shortly to be laid. The future movements of H. B. M. S. Champion depend on advices by the mail on the 29th inst.

STRANGE SCENES.

Singular Success of Mr. Marsden's Snap Shots.

There was a good house for Hon. Jos. Marsden's lecture on his travels in the far East at the Opera House on Saturday evening. Her Majesty was in the Royal box, accompanied by His Excellency Governor Cleghorn, Prince Kawananakoa, Major J. W. Robertson, H. M.'s Chamberlain, and Mrs. Wilson, lady in waiting. Colonel Claus Spreckels and Hon. W. G. Irwin were in the proprietary box opposite.

The lantern slides illustrating the lecture were handled by Hon. C. W. Ashford and Mr. C. Hedemanna of the Hawaiian Camera Club with their well-practiced skill. Many of them were the developments of snap shots taken by Mr. Marsden while traveling through Japan, China and India, in his quest of cheap labor last year, under commission of the Planters' Labor and Supply Company. These views were therefore of peculiar interest, as showing phases of Eastern life taken at random.

Mr. Marsden delivered his lecture in rich, rolling accents that kindled the monotony often attaching to such a lecture, and by interspersing his descriptions with a desultory fire of humor he frequently induced a ripple of laughter. Some of his passages rose to eloquence, particularly when dealing with the scenes of the Indian mutiny. The architectural views, comprising bits of city, temples, mosques, tombs, monuments, etc., were sharply defined and caused many huns of admiration to rise from the audience.

At the intermission Mr. Geo. C. Potter recited Tennyson's blood-stirring poem, "The Defense of Lucknow," displaying histrionic power of a high class. Mr. F. M. English, to his own accompaniment, sang "The Maudslayi," receiving loud applause.

All who were there, so far as heard from, say to the Camera Club, "Come again, and, if you cannot catch another traveler the equal of 'Jovial Jide,' with as good a portfolio of slides, trot the same gentleman out again."

THE LEE ROAD.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—

We are only a few tourists who within the last few days have traveled over the "Lee road" from Pahala to the Volcano House, and were astonished at the statements made in the letter signed "Taxpayer" in your issue of the 14th inst. Would it not be more honest in your correspondent when he makes four statements in his first paragraph, (three of which we can say to be absolutely untrue), to come out like a man, and if he is working for the common good, as the states, to sign his name to his letter? We do not know who he is, but when he says that "the road is in a bad state, the track many places completely worn away, and passage for vehicles only possible by turning off and taking a fresh course," we think that for some purpose of his own, either jealousy, petty spite or ignorance, which is evinced by his letter, he is worthy to step into the shoes of Annanus. The road is good. One of us made the journey over the lava four years ago, and was struck with the improvement, while we, one and all, were surprised that such difficulties could have been so skillfully overcome, and that such a road could have been made. The proof of its present good condition, is the fact that two gentlemen came from Pahala to the Volcano House yesterday in four hours, covering a distance of 23 miles of up grade mountain road.

"Taxpayer" states that the road cost Mr. Lee \$4000 or less. Now if he can prove by figures that this is a fact, well and good; but if he cannot do so, he is guilty of either misrepresentation or gross ignorance (which latter we are willing to excuse, although the law never does).

In conclusion, we hope that Mr. Lee, who has done, and is doing so much to render the Volcano House an attractive resort for tourists and others, may meet with the approbation and support of the Legislature and public generally, and get a "fair" price for his perseverance, pluck, and ability as shown in the "Lee road."

ANOTHER NOTCH.

The Crescents Defeat the Honolulu's by Good Ball Playing.

The ex-champions, Honolulu, dropped another to the Crescents on Saturday afternoon, giving the latter score second place. Willie Lucas was in the box for the Honolulu and pitched brilliant ball up to the seventh inning, when he was batted clean out of the box. The Honolulu team went to bat first and were not retired in time to save two runs. They failed to knock down any more until the fifth inning when they managed to straighten out Angus' curves for five runs. Their energy seemed to die out this stage and they tarried. The Crescents, however, went on the reverse, scoring one run in the sixth inning and with downright heavy slopping sent four men on a circuit of the bases in the succeeding one. In the eighth inning, when Jim's Lemon had been substituted for W. Lucas in the box, the Crescents hit him just as hard and sent two, and the winning ones, over the plate.

The game while interesting was not of an exciting character, the excitement being mostly on the part of the fair ones in the grand stand. Some pretty playing was done by the respective teams, and some dry ball was played by others. It was an off day with Peachblow Hart and he played a reckless game, as also did Johnny Soper at first. Hart relinquished himself somewhat by sending a three-bagger to deep right field in the eighth inning. Willie Windra at second was all serene. Star Percy played his usual brilliant game in the field and manipulated the wiflow with no less skill. Angus' pitching was good, and was ably supported by Chris Willis.

W. Lucas' pitching was of an excellent order for five innings, when his arm gave way and he was batted for singles, doubles and triples. A special feature was Glenn Wilder's back-stopping and E. Wodehouse's play at third. Number Ten Fay Wodehouse at first had three errors placed to his credit, and was tied by Charlie Wilder. Charlie had a far-away look and guarded short stop like a statue. Percy Lashman gave him a liner which toppled him over.
