

TREASURE TRAIN.

Pointer for Ponderers on Horner's Bank Bill.

Harper's Young People has the following on Uncle Sam's treasure train that lately crossed the continent:

Probably the richest train of cars that ever travelled over rails was one that left San Francisco a few days ago, carrying Uncle Sam's gold coin for use in the East. The train was composed of five cars, two of which were constructed of wrought steel, and supposed to be bullet and bomb proof.

These two cars were laden with 500 wooden boxes, each of which contained \$100,000 in five-dollar and ten-dollar pieces, aggregating the enormous sum of \$20,000,000. The boxes were shipped as registered mail packages, and were guarded by 51 Railway Mail Service men. This immense sum is only one-fifth part of a quantity of gold that has been stored at San Francisco for upwards of twenty years, and it is said that the sacks containing it actually rotted and broke open from the effects of dust and age. Young reulers may marvel at so large a treasure being kept hidden away in vaults for so long a time, and ask why it was not in circulation. At first sight it would appear that the country would be so much the richer if so many millions were circulating among the people. But, as a matter of fact, while the gold was hidden away, the money was actually in circulation, for it was represented by the "greenbacks" with which we are all more or less familiar, even if we should like to be. For every greenback issued by the Government, there must be a certain proportion of its money value in gold stored in the United States Treasury. If this were not so, Government might go on issuing bills as fast as they could be printed, and then they might distribute them among the people and everybody be rich.

How nice that would be, if it could only be done! But it cannot, for paper has no real value of its own; and in order to make an engraved piece of green-backed paper valuable, it must represent a certain amount of valuable metal actually in hand. This is a subject that is not easy to be understood; indeed, in some of its aspects it is at this present time puzzling the wisest heads in the world.
