LATE NEWS NUGGETS.

Intelligence from All Quarters by the Australian Mail.

Measles is very prevalent at Sydney. Whales are plentiful at the Haapai Group in the South Seas. Goldsbrough, Mort & Co., Melbourne, will continue in business. The World's Socialist Congress is in session at Zurich, Switzerland. The London Bank of Australia is organized with a capital of \$20,000,000.

The Victoria, Australia, Legislature has passed the income tax by 44 to 38. Five million dollars' worth of gold has been shipped in one week from London to New York.

N. Y. Loan & Mercantile Agency Co. will probably resume operations at an early date. The Australian and New Zealand Land Co. have declared a dividend of seven percent in London.

The Conservatives intend to propose the recommitment of the Irish Home Rule Bill for consideration of 41 new clauses.

Owing to financial failures there are 120,000 unemployed in the principal cities of the United States, and 50,000 in Chicago alone.

Mr. W. H. Grenfell, Liberal, has resigned his seat as a protest against the retention of Irish members in the House of Commons.

The Australian cricketers have played 27 matches in England, of which they have won 14 and lost seven, while six have been drawn.

The ship Frances Arago, with a cable to be laid between Queensland and New Caledonia, passed Thursday Island August 9 en route to Brisbane.

Germany has decided to construct a military port at the mouth of the Elbe, to protect the Baltic and North Sea Canal, at a cost of £3,500,000.

Public opinion in the United States comments on the action of the President in promptly dealing with the silver question, and postponing the tariff revision.

Insurgents who attempted to take the city of La Plata, in the Argentine, were repulsed by the Government troops after an engagement in which 400 rebels were killed.

The Sydney Telegraph says editorially, "Since the beginning of the second week in July there has been a marked recovery in almost all descriptions of Australian securities in London."

The Government accepted an amendment compelling members of the Irish Parliament to take the oath of allegiance, and another amendment excluding priests from sitting in Parliament.

A motion by Mr. Storey, that the Home Rule Bill should become law after passing the House of Commons three times, regardless of the House of Lords, has been "counted out" in the Commons.

A mass meeting of 20,000 people at Liverpool (England), has protested against the Government permitting the Irish members to dominate the Commons by stifling the Home Rule debate.

Sir Edward Grey says that British interests have been fully maintained in Siam, and that France has signed an agreement assenting to a "buffer State." Mr. A. J. Balfour considers that a "buffer State" is a poor substitute for the separation of Siam.

The "silver" Democrats in the House of Representatives have agreed to oppose the repeal of the Sherman Act, unless the present system is replaced by free coinage. They have resolved to appoint a committee to draft a Free Coinage Bill.

It is reported 40,000 Midland miners are discussing an offer of the masters to resume work on the old terms. Thirty thousand Welsh miners have resumed work at an advance of one-half percent. The Scotch miners intend to strike unless their wages are raised a shilling per day.

A convention of Parnellites, held in Dublin, passed a resolution to the effect that no Bill would be acceptable which did not fulfil the conditions Mr. Parnell demanded in 1891, and that no settlement could be considered final until the prisoners now in confinement were amnestied, and the claims of the evicted tenants satisfied.

Telegrams from New York state that the closing of the silver mines in Denver has caused extreme distress among the people. Thousands of persons are in a starving condition, with no better shelter than that afforded by the parks. The citizens, fearing that riots may ensue, are organizing committees for the distribution of charitable relief among the destitute.

There is a ministerial crisis in New Zealand on the temperance question. Sir Robert Stout, who has returned to the Legislature as a free lance, promoted a bill for local option to its passage on second reading. The Ministry had promised that if Sir Robert's bill passed second reading it would bring in a bill to satisfy all parties. On a motion to wait for the ministerial bill, the Government was sustained by a majority of only two.

In the House of Commons Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett, Conservative member for Evesham (Shelfield), inquired if the Government were aware that the closing of the Indian mines against the free coinage of silver had lessened the value of British securities to the extent of £130,000,000. Mr. Gladstone, in reply, said he was not aware that the alleged reduction had taken place, but, in any case, the Government must decline to interpose in the matter.

Mr. A. J. Balfour, M. P., delivered an address at a meeting of London financiers. He expressed himself in favor of the adoption of a bi-metallic system, as he believed its stability would secure an advantage to British commerce. Mr. Balfour said that the laws which made silver a legal tender in one country and not a legal tender in another were relics of barbarism and injurious to commerce. He desired a settlement of the silver question in order that the stability and value of silver might be maintained.
