memoranda by his own hand, his name is Jassont. The error of the modern historians in getting his name wrong, proves the late date at which they commenced to search for facts, and the little trouble they took to sift them. The genealogical tree now in my possession was in the care of my late uncle John Rives and my two aunts, but the historians took the easier course of drawing upon the fund of slander ready to their hand and their own imaginations.

I have before me the official certificate of my grandfather's death from the French Consulate in Mexico, in which by some error his father's name Jean Baptiste is inserted as that of the dead man. The error may be traced to the fact that the Consular official notes that the death was testified to by two witnesses, and from which it would appear that Jassont died after a short illness among countrymen who were strangers, and by an error entered his father's name, which the modern historian has adopted.

A word as to the story about Rives' conduct in London. Kekuanoa, who was one of the royal party, was related to my father, and I well remember in my girlhood hearing from him about the royal party while in London, and he never had a disparaging word to say about my grandfather, although he spoke freely about the events of the journey to myself and family, and there are several persons still living who remember his words.

On the return of the King's party, Boki circulated a villainous story to save himself from well-deserved punishment. Boki's violent temper was well-known and remarked by all who knew him, and his close kinship to the royal family gave him a certain amount of scope to exercise it abroad, as well as at home. The story he had concocted to throw the blame on Rives for the death of the King and Queen was soon exposed. It was proved that Rives was in France when the royal pair fell sick, and once, in the absence of Liholiho, Boki violently beat the Queen, who was then ill with measles, and thereby hastened her death. The King on returning was informed by the attendants of the conduct of Boki, and reproached him in words that have been handed down to this day, and, in despair at the death of his Queen, Liholiho sickened and died.

When Boki found the story of his violent conduct becoming known he wanted to go after sandalwood, and persuading the chiefs to fit out an expedition for him he left and met his just fate. I have nothing to retract from the statements in my former letter regarding what I consider the prejudiced sources of modern history in relation to my grandfather, the late Rives. I am confident that posterity will be more just. As to Query's admiration of his infallible Arago, might I not suggest to Query the motto of "put yourself in his place" and picture to Query the fact of his being one of, possibly, the only half a dozen Europeans here in that age, and to be found by Avago minus his claw-hammer coat and reduced to "silks and top boots."

Query may be a public man, or trying like Diogenes to be a philosopher under a tub. In either case what sort of character does he suppose his opponents will give him in a few years? If he occupies a prominent position as Rives did, his best motives will be misjudged by some soulless cynic. As to my second anonymous critic signing himself a "Friend," I can only say to him that I am only concerned in probing the probable sources from whence originated the calumny that has been heaped on my dead ancestor whose good name, as we have always heard of it, is as precious to us as that of the Rev. Mr. Ellis is to him, and in my mention of Rev. Ellis was intended. As to no disparagement of "Friend's" endorsement of Professor Alexander as a well credited historian, I am dealing with a particular instance and not generalities. I could, however, mention a notable instance in our own time in which the Professor has shown a considerable desire to be discreetly silent. I hope the day may be far distant when it may be said that I have proved to be an inconsistent adherent of the faith to which "Friend" refers, but I trust that I shall ever be able to judge between the divine principle of truth and the statements of fallible men. My duty to my ancestor to resent false charges whether made in ignorance or recklessness by members of the same faith may cause me to be misunderstood, but it is none the less a duty to show how false is Jarvis' statement about Jassont Rives' standing in the matter of property. I append a list of lands held by him when he left here with Liholiho, and which were enjoyed by his family until they were confiscated on the false report of Boki. In the reign of Kamehameha III. a portion of the property was restored to the family, who continued to enjoy it. Lands belonging to Jassont Rives when he left with Liholiho for Europe:
