Carnot and his staff were escorted on board the French flagship Formidable, where they were received by Admiral Boissoudry and staff. Shortly afterward Admiral Avelan and the commanders of the Russian war vessels went on board the French flagship to witness the review of the vessels of the Mediterranean squadron. Later President Carnot boarded the Russian flagship Emperor Nicholas I. to which he was welcomed by the Russian Ambassador, Baron de Mohrenheim. The President was treated with the same courtesy as the Czar of Russia himself would have received. The point most commented upon in connection with the review is the fact that as President Carnot passed down the line formed by the Russian war ships a royal salute was fired, which honor is specially reserved for the Czar.

OBSEQUIES OF GOUNOD.
The remains of the great composer, Gounod, were buried at Paris on October 27th with full civic and military honors. Many of those present at the funeral were celebrities in the arts and sciences from all parts of France. This hearse was followed by two large chariots laden with floral offerings and other colossal tributes borne on the shoulders of those following the casket. All the musical societies of France sent delegations, who marched in the procession and sang as the cortege passed to the church of La Madeleine, where a solemn musical service was held.

SOCIALISTS IN SESSION.
There was a stormy session to-day of the socialist congress, says a Cologne despatch of October 27. After a warm exchange of remarks, more personal than parliamentary, the congress resolved that the Social Democratic party repeats its expression of sympathy with the trades union movement and imposes upon all members the duty of untiringly working for the recognition of the importance of trades unions, and to do their utmost to strengthen these organizations.

BISMARCK IS WELL.
In view of the sensational reports regarding the health of Prince Bismarck the London agent of the Associated Press caused special inquiries to be made at Friedrichsruhe in the afternoon of October 27. The result is that the Associated Press is authorized to state that the alarming stories printed about Bismarck and the bad condition of his health are unfounded. The Prince is in a good state of health and is able to take daily walks.

The anniversary of the capitulation of Metz was observed in the usual way in Berlin on October 27 by a banquet at the Kaiserhof. The Emperor was in attendance, as well as many royal and illustrious guests. Fifield Church, near Abingdon, England, built in the thirteenth century, has been burned.

OTHER LANDS.
A Lima, Peru, despatch of Oct. 27 says: The action of Congress in annulling the municipal elections provoked general resistance throughout the republic. The excitement which it created is most serious. Commerce was paralyzed to-day and the streets were patrolled by soldiers. Trouble is expected.

It is said now that the sinking of the Haitian gunboat Alexander Petron, at first regarded as mysterious, was effected by revolutionists. Mount Calbuco volcano, Chili, is very active, and the streets of Osorio are filled with piles of ashes from the crater.

President Barrios of Guatemala has decreed that labor should henceforth be free all over the country. The Nippon Yusen Kaisha (owners of the immigrant steamers that come to Honolulu) have started a line of steamers to run between Japan and India every three weeks. An earthquake has happened in Kagoshi, Japan, the heaviest for fifty or sixty years.

An extensive conspiracy has been discovered by the Government of Nicaragua. Several prominent residents of Leon have been imprisoned, and others banished.

Forty French soldiers were attacked in the desert and defeated, after resisting all day and losing twelve killed. King Lobengula's forces were defeated at Matabele by the British in a heavy battle.
