LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Captain and Mrs. Metcalf intend leaving on the S. S. Australia on Saturday next for the Coast.

The P. G. band gave its usual weekly morning concert on the Executive building grounds this morning.

Commander Whiting, U. S. N., and Miss C. P. Afong will be married in the Central Union Church this evening.

S. Kuby & Co., the enterprising cigarette manufacturers, make a liberal offer to their patrons in this issue.

The P. G. band will give a concert at the Hawaiian Hotel to-morrow evening at 8:15, and there will be a hop after the concert.

The schooner Vine sailed from San Francisco Nov. 28 for Samoa via Honolulu. She will enter this port if everything is favorable.

The mail from the Post Office for the Coast to day on the Oceanic consisted of 6370 letters and 3162 papers. The Arawa carried a mail yesterday.

Seven members of the bar, two court interpreters, three policemen and a stenographer went by the Kinaiu this afternoon to attend the jury term at Lahaina.

The Hawaiian National band will play during the dinner given by Japanese residents to the officers of H. I. J. M. S. Naniwa at the Hawaiian Hotel this evening.

Members of the Hawaiian Sportsmen's Association purchased a number of game birds on the S. S. Oceanic to-day for the purpose of letting them loose in the country.

Mr. Theo. H. Davies and son were passengers by the Kinaiu for windward this afternoon. Mr. C. S. Kyunerley, wife, maid and child also returned to their home at Kohala, Hawaii.

The Misses Albu, the English vocalists, held a rehearsal in the Opera House yesterday afternoon. Owing to the great demand for tickets, the box plan has been opened a day ahead of advertised time.

While the steamship Oceanic was swinging her bow seaward this noon a blade of her propeller came in contact with one of the P. M. S. S. wharf piles, which resulted in the pile's being broken in two.

Detective Tona arrested a Japanese deserter from Spreckelsville plantation in town this morning after the latter had been nine months at large. He will be returned to Maui on the Claudine this evening.

A native pleaded guilty in the District Court this morning of playing the cha fa and was fined \$10. Captain Andrews says there is no use keeping awake nights to collar cha fa fiends if they are going to be let off so easily.

A letter addressed to Cyril O. Smith, Kukuihaele, was picked up on the street and mailed from the BULLETIN office, as the writer of it probably intended to send it by the Kinaiu and there was not time to advertise it.

Ah See, the Chinese steward of the steamer Mikahala, who was arrested on that steamer with twenty-seven tins of opium by Captain Parker, pleaded guilty before Judge Robertson. Sentence was suspended until Tuesday next.

This month's Anglican Church Chronicle begins the twelfth year of that periodical's existence. It loses none of its interest with increasing years and its editor, Rev. A. Mackintosh, is to be congratulated on its continued prosperity.

The crew on the S. S. Oceanic which left at noon to-day made a goodly sum while that steamer was lying in port selling Manila cigars at fifty cents for fifty. A duty of fifty cents was collected at the gate by Customs Officer Cook.

A drunken native named Enoka got into a hack at noon to-day, while the owner was absent, and rode about town, finally being halted on Maunakea street. Part of the harness was gone. The owner caused his arrest at 3 o'clock for malicious injury.

The O. & O. S. S. Oceanic sailed shortly after noon to-day for San Francisco. She took no cargo from this port. Messrs. P. C. Jones and Weddig and Gen. W. H. Dimond and three steamer passengers were from this port. The P. G. band was in attendance.


