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LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

The Count of Monte Cristo. The Kinau brought only fifty bags of sugar this trip.

C. Nestor Edison left yesterday on the S. S. China for the Orient. There will be a battalion drill on Palace Square to-morrow evening.

There were no passengers for the Volcano by the W. G. Hall this trip. Twelve tourists returned by the steamer Kinau this morning from the Volcano.

Less than 40 voters registered today. The total at close of the sitting was 1067.

Dr. Grossman owns a fine St. Bernard dog. He has sent it to Olaa plantation. A furnished residence on Beretania street is for rent on application at this office.

Dan Lyons' dancing class for gentlemen meets at Arion hall this evening at 7 o'clock. The Mannerehoi Harmony will meet in the Pacific Club to-morrow evening for practice.

Attention of coal consumers is called to the Tagawa coal for which G. E. Boardman is agent. Diamond Head, 3 p. m.—Weather clear, wind fresh northeast. Four-masted schooner coal laden off port.

Customs officers amuse themselves filling up skippers of vessels with stories about the "rotten royalists." Dr. E. A. Lundy has gone to Yokohama where he intends to locate. The doctor left on the S. S. China.

W. Jas. Smith has resigned the office of Secretary of the Board of Education after an incumbency of 29 years. Harry Saylor was sentenced to pay a fine of \$30 in the District Court to-day for running a gambling joint on Hotel street.

Minister Willis visited the U. S. flagship Philadelphia this afternoon, receiving a salute of fifteen guns on retiring. The P. G. band played for the edification of the "warriors" on the Executive building grounds this morning.

The candidates for the constitutional convention nominated on Kauai are W. H. Rice, G. N. Wilcox and A. S. Wilcox. Monte Cristo will be presented at the Opera House to-night by the Daily Stock Company. The curtain will be raised at 8 o'clock.

A goodly share of the proceeds of the railway excursion to Ewa this evening will go to the fund for furnishing the Sailors' Home. The uniforms of the P. G. guards are being made by Chinese tailors. An array of uniforms can be seen daily in shops along Nuuanu street.

The outgoing passengers from this port by the S. S. China yesterday evening were seven European cabin and 151 Chinese and 144 Japanese steerage passengers. C. L. Carter was elected as a candidate to the constitutional convention by Second District Club, defeating M. A. Gonsalves, the nominee of the Portuguese, by 81 to 68.

Two lots on the Pearl City peninsula were sold by J. F. Morgan at noon to-day to J. J. Williams at \$400 each. It is said Jimmy is going to open a photograph gallery down there. The household furniture of A. J. Cartwright will be sold at the residence, Koaunohu and Lunalilo streets, at 10 o'clock to-morrow. The premises were open for inspection to-day.

Mrs. E. Powell, Miss Jane Cameron and Miss C. Little were passengers by the schooner C. S. Holmes, from Port Blakely to-day. They are the guests of Captain Johnson and intend returning on the same vessel. There will be a moonlight excursion to the Ewa plantation on the Oahu railway this evening. The special train will leave at 7:45 o'clock, returning at 10:15 o'clock. Tickets for the round trip, seventy-five cents.

Arthur White, of the Arlington billiard parlors, left on the schooner Robert Lewers this afternoon for a two months' vacation on the Coast. He intended leaving on the S. S. China, but was unable to finish up his business in time. The four Chinamen who were poisoned on Saturday through drinking the juice of a wood have all recovered. Prof. Lyons will make his report to the coroner's jury to-morrow on his examination of the contents of the stomachs of the three men who died.

DISGUSTED PORTUGUESE. They Regard Themselves Sold by Their American Allies. The Portuguese American League has dissolved and severed all relations with the American League. Instead of working in harmony, the Portuguese asserting, their allies were working against them all the time. They went back on all their promises, opposing the Portuguese at the last two elections. Last night A. V. Peters, vice-president of the Portuguese American League, tore down the Portuguese flag while the American League was in session, giving as his reason that the flag was too old and honorable a one to be among traitors. M. A. Gonsalves received only 68 votes, and it is claimed that not one of them came from the American League.

The Portuguese factions are now all consolidated, and are working in harmony with each other. A mass meeting will be called on Kinau street this evening.

JUDICIARY JOTTINGS.

Two Kauai Decisions—Complicated Cow Controversy. The will of the late ("Mother") Asenath C. Green has been sent down from Maui for safe keeping in the Judiciary Department. It leaves the property, consisting of two parcels of land, to Laura C. Green, daughter, and nominates Geo. C. Beckwith as executor without bonds.

A decision of Judge Hardy of Kauai has been filed in the case of Anina and Awana, doing business under the name of Nam Chong & Company, vs. Laukuna. It is an action of ejectment based on leases of lands belonging to Queen Kapiolani. Judgment is given for plaintiffs to recover the premises for the remainder of their term, with \$319.33 damages and their costs. Magoon and Kinney for plaintiffs; Hartwell for defendants.

Another decision sent up by Judge Hardy is on a batch of interwoven suits as follows: 1. L. Madeiros vs. Manoel Rodrigues (Jardin), to recover a red cow of the value of \$15; judgment in District Court for plaintiff, and appeal to Circuit Court dismissed on the ground that the tender of \$20 (in lieu of bond) was not made within the proper time.

2. Suit for \$100 damages by Madeiros against Rodrigues; for illegally taking the cow, and depriving plaintiff of her milk to the value of \$36; for putting him to great trouble, etc., \$50; for value of calf, \$10. The District Court dismissed the case because the summons was not made returnable within ten days. This judgment was reversed by the Circuit Court, and the case remanded to the District Court for trial.

3. Maria Jardin, a minor, by her father, Manoel Rodrigues Jardin, as next friend, vs. L. Madeiros, to recover a red cow, with damages of \$50. To make a long story short, as Blackstone would say, defendant in No. 3—Madeiros—takes the cow, the Court deciding that the matter was made res judicata by the decision of the lower Court in case No. 1, from which no appeal was properly made. Rosa for plaintiff; Hartwell for defendant.

W. A. Kinney and A. G. M. Robertson go to Maui this evening on the famous Wailuku water right case. ADMIRAL WALKER RECEIVED. He Pays His Respects to the President and Ministers.

This forenoon Rear Admiral John G. Walker, commanding the Pacific station, was presented to President Dole in the executive chamber, the gold room of the former royal palace. Hon. A. S. Willis, United States Minister Plenipotentiary, did the presentation. The President was attended by Major Potter, his aide-de-camp, who ushered in the visitors, and aiding in the reception were Chief Justice Judd and Associate Justices Bickerton and Frear; F. M. Hatch, Minister of Foreign Affairs; S. M. Damon, Minister of Finance, and W. F. Allen and D. B. Smith, members of the Advisory Council.

The President's military staff as commander-in-chief was in attendance, comprising Lieutenant Colonel J. H. Fisher, acting colonel, Major Pratt, Capt. Hall and Gartenberg, and Surgeon Cooper. The Admiral was attended by his aide and his secretary, Lieuts. Staunton and Wood respectively. Fifteen minutes were spent by the visitors in sociable conversation with the President and party. The guards did the honors outside, aided by the band, which played "Star Spangled Banner" as arms were presented.

RETURNS THE VISIT. National Salute to the President by the Flagship. President S. B. Dole returned the visit of Admiral John G. Walker this afternoon, accompanied by Ministers Damon and Hatch, Chief Justice Judd, Associate Justice Bickerton, Major Potter and Colonel Fisher. The president was received with a salute of twenty-one guns both on arriving on board and leaving the cruiser, the Hawaiian flag being displayed at the maintop, beside the Admiral's flag. There was quite a crowd on the city front watching the proceedings. A detachment of marines on H. M. S. Champion honored the party with presenting arms.

BIG HAUL OF GAMBLERS.

Thirty-one Che Fa Players Captured by Strategy. Senior Captain Andrews, Lieutenant Holi, Officers Kaapa, Lokana, Kabele and Mitchell stationed themselves amongst the taro patches at Melaiyere's residence, early this morning, to await a favorable opportunity to pounce on a che fa bank, which has gained considerable notoriety recently. It was the rule to open the bank at 8 o'clock, and the vicinity used to be crowded with people at 6 o'clock. This morning was no exception to the rule. The officers in ambush watched the usual crowd wending their way to the bank. At the usual time the bank opened and the gamblers were given about half an hour, to allow the game to get in full swing. At an appointed signal the officers jumped out and surrounded the game, displaying pistols and clubs. The gang were taken by surprise and were marched to the street, before they knew what was up. At the station they were searched and che fa tickets, besides \$18 in small coin, were taken from their pockets. Thirty-one were charged with playing che fa, a game by which money is lost and won.
