LADIES TAKING THE OATH.

Female Teachers Obey the Edict of President Castle.

A levy of five lady school teachers appeared in the Clerk's office of the Judiciary Department this afternoon to take the oath of allegiance. One of them allowed a BULLETIN reporter to see the following circular, which explains this strange recognition of woman's rights:

"BOARD OF EDUCATION, HONOLULU, H. I., July 30th, 1894. To the Employees of the Board of Education:

"By order of the President of the Board of Education, W. R. Castle, Esq., I am instructed to inform you that all teachers, and other employees of the Board, male or female, must take the oath to support the Constitution, Laws and Government of the Republic of Hawaii.

"ALATAU T. ATKINSON, "Inspector-General of Schools."

RESTORATION OF THE FLAG.

The Occasion is Fittingly Celebrated by Patriotic Hawaiians.

To-day, July 31st, being the anniversary of the restoration of the Hawaiian flag, the day is being duly celebrated by true and patriotic Hawaiians. The flag was restored by Rear-Admiral Thomas, R. N., on July 31, 1843, and in commemoration of the event the park known as Thomas Square was laid out, and under the supervision and guardianship of the government remains until this day. The day is being fittingly celebrated, several libels being given in the city. One on a large scale was given by a prominent Hawaiian in the vicinity of Thomas Square.

Early this morning the Hawaiian National band serenaded Queen Liliuokalani at her residence, Washington Place. This evening the same popular band will give a grand concert at the Hawaiian Hotel, commencing at 7:30 o'clock, when the following program will be rendered:
