Timely Topics

The movement to widen Beretania street from Punchbowl street to the Nuuanu stream is a matter which should receive the favorable consideration of the government because it is of interest to every one. It comes directly under the head of improvements and a petition to Minister King would probably have his approval when it was brought up for consideration. There are not many finer drives than on Beretania street from Punahou street to Punchbowl street, but there the squeeze begins and the good road ceases. To widen the street would not benefit any one man or set of men, the benefit would be to the masses. 
