WILL UNGER'S DEATH.

The Popular Guard-man's Experience in Honolulu.

Will Unger, aged 42 years, died yesterday morning of Bright's disease of the kidneys and will be buried to-day from his late residence, 114 1/2 Page street.

The Unger family are well known in San Francisco. His sister Kitty, now dead, was a popular light opera singer. Two brothers of the deceased are living. Frank L. Unger, a well-known society man and amateur musician, is now abroad with H. M. Gillig and Donald de V. Graham.

Will Unger belonged to Company B, First Infantry, National Guard of California, and was a crack rifle-shot. Twenty years ago he was a member of the City Guards. In 1879 he went to Honolulu, where he became captain of Company B, Honolulu Rifles, the star military organization of the islands. He was in the revolution of 1887, and during his residence at Honolulu his house was a popular military headquarters. With King Kalakaua he was very friendly, and when he departed from the islands the King presented him with a gold medal and Company B gave him a diamond locket and chain. Expecting that he would return at a later date, Kalakaua declined to accept his military resignation.

At the time of the late rebellion Unger was invited to return to the islands, and was tendered by the royal Cabinet a high military appointment. It was his intention to accept it and go back to Honolulu next September, but during the great railroad strike he took a severe cold at Sacramento and his health became so bad that his physician positively forbade him to make the journey. He had many medals—trophies of his skill as a sharp-shooter, but of late years he has not entered any of the rifle-shooting contests, contenting himself with coaching a team that won the prize. He leaves a wife and child.—S. F. Chronicle, March 5.

He Denies Rumors of a Filibustering Expedition

The following is from a San Francisco paper:

W. H. Cornwell, ex-Minister of Finance of Hawaii under the monarchy, who has been ill with pneumonia in his rooms at the Palace, has so far recovered as to enable him to sit up and converse with friends and occasional visitors. In speaking of Hawaii and the rumor which had been spread to the effect that a filibustering party would be organized and equipped on this coast for the purpose of reinstating the Queen, Mr. Cornwell said:

"I do not believe there is anything in the rumor except mere talk, which may have been suggested by the wishes of some ardent royalist who is probably an irresponsible party. I am personally acquainted with all the leading men among the refugees and we are on friendly terms. If there was such a movement on foot I am pretty sure I would have been apprised of it. I don't think there is any desire on the part of the better class of royalists and Hawaiian patriots to make the least trouble in the future. Only irresponsible adventurers would attempt such a thing as a filibustering expedition."

THE DEPORTED SIX

They Refuse to Talk About Hawaiian Affairs

Among the arrivals on the steamer Australia from Honolulu yesterday, says the Chronicle of March 3, were six persons who were declared by the officials of the Government of Hawaii to have taken an obnoxious part in the recent unpleasantness, and who preferred to be deported rather than stand trial for treason. They are James Brown, Charles Creighton, John Radin, A. P. Peterson, F. Wundenberg and Fred Redward. The particulars of the offenses charged against them have been published. Peterson is an attorney, and will be remembered as the person who accompanied Sam Parker to San Francisco six or seven months ago. None of the six passengers were inclined to discuss their troubles with the Hawaiian Government when seen yesterday. They had all made up their minds that the airing of their views could not improve matters very much, and they accordingly declared that they had nothing to say when seen aboard the steamer upon its arrival. They all went ashore as soon as the steamer docked.
