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

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.

UNITED STATES.

Wheat rates at 85.3, two points lower than last year after the March freeze.

Laureate captured the big stake at the Arkansas Derby. It was one mile three furlongs for \$2000 guaranteed.

Slosson challenges any man in the country for two billiard matches next month.

Great secrecy is being manifested by the Herrshoffs regarding the construction of the yacht to defend the America cup.

As soon as a warship is available, President Cleveland will send a commission to examine the route of the Nicaragua canal.

Cornell University is certain to send a crew to England, the requisite \$7000 having been quickly subscribed.

Chief Justice Fuller's daughter is to get a divorce without contest from Aubrey.

There is danger that Taylors, the Carrollton, Missouri, murderers, will be lynched.

President Cleveland has received an invitation from leading citizens of Chicago, irrespective of party, for a public reception to himself and Mrs. Cleveland, as an expression of appreciation of the President's steadfast insistence on the preservation of a sound national currency.

Four thousand coal miners are on strike in Iowa.

The income tax law is in the hands of Chief Justice Fuller. There are four Associates against and three for the constitutionality of the law. If the Chief Justice, who has not revealed his mind to his colleagues, sides with the minority there will be a tie and the law will stand.

Governor McKinley and party have called on the President in Washington.

Utah's constitutional convention will likely adopt woman suffrage by a large majority.

A Washington special to the Chronicle says Secretary Gresham is liable to retire from the Cabinet voluntarily before the first of July. It is hinted that, besides being weary of the office, Gresham is disappointed at not being upheld in a foreign policy such as would make him popular and a candidate for the presidency.

ANGLO AMERICAN TROUBLE FEARED.

A Washington dispatch of the 1st instant says the Secretary of State is very much concerned over the Venezuelan question.

It appears Ambassador Bayard has not succeeded in inducing the British Government to submit the border dispute to arbitration.

Armed bodies of British and Venezuelan troops are pressing each other closely in the disputed territory, and there may be a hostile clash at any moment.

The Administration has been considering the course to pursue in such a case, and it is entirely probable that if the British persist in bringing about such a collision, by their failure to heed the repeated warnings and requests of the United States to submit the matter to arbitration, the United States will feel obliged to follow the moral aid it has given to Venezuela in this matter by more substantial assistance.

Admiral Meade's squadron was ordered to sail from Kingston, Jamaica, on Saturday for Colon. At the isthmus the squadron will comprise the cruisers New York, Minneapolis, Columbia, Atlanta, Raleigh and Cincinnati.

To these will soon be added the Montgomery, which is about to sail for Havana. At the same time the Ranger is about due at Panama on the Pacific side of the isthmus, while the ponderous coast defense monitor Monterey, which has been ordered from California to Callao, Peru, will stop at Panama for coal. The bu-jackets on vessels at Panama in Pacific waters could quickly send reinforcements if thought desirable by way of the Panama Railroad to Admiral Meade's squadron at Colon.

The vessels under Admiral Meade,

before enumerated, carry metal enough in one broadside, as a navy officer graphically put it, to blow the whole Mosquito coast into the middle of Lake Nicaragua.

There is no doubt this hastening of the itinerary of Admiral Meade is caused by special secret orders which will meet him at Colon. These orders, it may be safely assumed, will direct him to coal his fleet as quickly as possible and proceed at once to Bluefields.

EUROPE.

There were enthusiastic demonstrations of Germans throughout the world in honor of Bismarck's 80th birthday. The Prince addressed a large body of students at Friederichsruh, giving his idea of Germany's true policy. Emperor William toasted the Prince at a grand banquet.

Herbert Asquith, Home Secretary, announced in the House of Commons that the Irish political prisoners O'Callaghan and McCann had been released. Each had served twelve years of his term. O'Callaghan's eyesight is going fast, Mr. Asquith said, and McCann has passed his seventieth year.

The Paris Temps demands an apology to France from England for recent utterances of Sir Edward Gray and Joseph Chamberlain.

A British relief force of 100 men has crossed the Afghan frontier to rescue Mr. Robertson, the British agent at Chitral, which is closely invested by Sher Afzul.

American railway securities are improving in the London market on various signs of widening trade prospects.

A railway congress to include American delegates is to be held in London.

OTHER LANDS.

Mexico and Guatemala have settled their dispute peacefully. It is believed Guatemala will apologize and that indemnity to Mexico will be submitted to arbitration.

Work on the Panama canal is paralyzed by a strike. An attempt to burn the city of Colon was frustrated.

THE CUBAN REBELLION.

It is rumored in Washington that a prominent Eastern shipbuilding firm has agreed to furnish the Cuban insurgents a torpedo boat at an early day, which will be used in destroying Spanish war vessels cruising in Cuban waters.

Owing to the dispatch of reinforcements to Cuba, the Spanish Government has called out 20,000 men to complete the effective strength of the army.

Joe Henderson, ex-Auditor of Indiana, who has just returned from Cuba, says the intelligent Cubans are anxious for independence.

ON BOARD THE CRUISER.

Thousands of Hawaiians Visit the Flagship Philadelphia.

The steam launches of the U. S. cruiser Philadelphia were kept busy between the hours of one and five o'clock on Saturday afternoon conveying Hawaiian visitors on board. It was a varied crowd, including, besides many in attractive holiday attire, boys without shoes, men without coats, men with leis, fat and lean wahines. Each boat was loaded to the water's edge. A good many got wet, a stiff breeze blowing throughout the day.

The visitors were received at the gangway by orderlies and the ship was given a thorough inspection. The natives were much gratified with the opportunity given them, and several took two trips. The cruiser will be thrown open to the natives again on Saturday next. It is estimated that more than two thousand visited her last Saturday.

Appropriated a Turtle.

A Chinaman caught a small turtle in a taro patch belonging to an elderly native at Niolopa this morning. John took the turtle to the fish market to sell it. The owner of the taro patch heard about it and hid himself to the market, saw the turtle, the only one that happened to be there, and took it right in front of the Chinaman's eyes. The Chinaman fussed and fumed but the old man would not give back the turtle. The Chinaman appealed to the police, but got no satisfaction.
