

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## COWARDLY ASSAULT.

Gus Nelson Attacks Captain Cook of the Patrol and Gets Six Months — Carl Wichart to be heard on the Same Charge

Captain Henry Cook of the mounted patrol discharged two of his men yesterday, Gus Nelson, better known in the department as "Tricks," and Carl Wichart. The captain took his men to the baseball grounds for the usual daily drill. The captain noticed that these two men were under the influence of liquor, hence the discharge. The men returned into town, donned citizens' clothes and visited several saloons. After 7 o'clock in the afternoon the men passed the BULLETIN office heading for the Gumpfer lodging house where they roomed.

Captain Cook and a friend were walking along Merchant street with the intention of going to the station, when in front of W. G. Irwin & Co.'s warehouse Nelson rushed to the captain and struck him with a club. The captain was taken unawares but he managed to ward the blow with his left arm, receiving a wound below the elbow. The captain was somewhat dazed and it was impossible for him to say whether the second blow he received under the right eye was from the club or fist. Nelson then made good his escape.

The cowardly assault was reported and the captain was taken to Dr. Cooper's to have his injuries attended to. Nelson's room at Gumpfer's was searched and a Winchester rifle found. Officers were sent out to arrest Nelson and before 8 o'clock he was found in a restaurant on Hotel street and taken to the Police station where he was charged with assault and battery.

In the District Court today Nelson pleaded guilty. He declined to say anything except that it was his fault. He denied having used a club, but says it was a stick. Captain Cook and Deputy Marshal Brown made statements. Judge Wilcox sentenced Nelson to six months imprisonment at hard labor. Nelson tried to induce the Deputy Marshal to allow him to leave the country, but the boon was refused.

Wichart the second patrolman who was discharged, was also placed under arrest last night. He is believed to have been present when the assault took place. The charge against him is being present and countenancing the assault. He pleaded not guilty and his case was continued until to-morrow.

## Thrown From A Bicycle.

Willie Chung Hoon, the twelve-year old son of Chung Hoon, met with an accident on Friday afternoon while returning from school. He was riding a bicycle on Nuuanu street going home when a native cowboy on horseback collided with his wheel throwing him to the ground. Willie was picked up unconscious. He remained in that state until Saturday. Yesterday Doctors Brodie and Herbert removed a piece of bone from the lad's skull, and now he is resting easy. The boy will recover.

## Amateur Athletic Club

There was a fairly good attendance at the meeting of the Honolulu Amateur Athletic Club yesterday evening. The following were elected officers: C. S. Crane, president; D. F. Thrum, vice-president; Henry Hapi, secretary; W. F. Forbes, treasurer; board of management, W. G. Johnson, D. Crozier and E. A. Jacobson. The free-for-all meet to take place on June 15 was the subject of a short discussion.

## CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

Adultery Cases, Probate Matters and Other Items of Interest.

In the matter of the guardianship of the Luk Sang minors, Henry Smith, master in chancery, has filed his report on the guardian's account. The report shows total receipts to be \$8897.30, expenditures \$6246.01, leaving a balance in the hands of the guardian of \$2651.29.

The hearing of the petition for letters of administration in the estate of A. P. Peterson comes up on Saturday; also the hearing of the application of the estate of M. Nahai for the allowance of his accounts and final discharge.

Judge Cooper has been engaged this morning in hearing the case of the Republic of Hawaii vs. Kahakaula and Kilikina who are charged with committing adultery in Honolulu within one month prior to October 16, 1894. Deputy Attorney-General Robertson appeared for the prosecution and J. K. Kaula and J. M. Poepeo for the defendants.

The following jury was empaneled: W. K. Waiansu, T. R. Moesman, C. B. Dwight, J. W. Mabelona, C. A. Long, J. Nalus, J. C. Kawai-nui, Aebi K. Akau, H. Kolomoku, H. E. Cooke, J. Paauani and C. P. Kanakanui.

The prosecution called as witnesses Moke, G. Kaomea, D. Kaapa and D. Lokana and offered in evidence a marriage certificate of one Hatch and Karikina.

Attorney Poepeo for the defense moved that the defendants be discharged. The Court promptly overruled his motion and counsel excepted.

After introducing five witnesses the defense rested. Argument was made by J. K. Kaula for the defense and Judge Robertson for the prosecution.

Judge Cooper's charge to the jury occupied just seven minutes in its delivery and translation and at twelve minutes past one the jury retired to consider their verdict.

After an absence of fifteen minutes the jury brought in a verdict of guilty, three dissenting.

The next case to come up will be that of the Republic vs. Kauli also charged with adultery.

Court then adjourned until 2:30 p. m.

## THE BOAT CLUBS.

An Amalgamation Committee Appointed at Last Night's Meeting.

Delegates from the Healani, Leilani and Myrtle boat clubs met in the boathouse of the last-named club yesterday evening for the purpose of discussing the forming of a rowing association. The clubs were represented as follows: Healani—C. W. Macfarlane, A. L. C. Atkinson and J. A. Low; Myrtles—A. G. M. Robertson, A. W. Carter and W. C. Parke; Leilani—J. S. Low, W. H. McInerney and G. E. Smithies.

After discussing the necessity for such an amalgamation a committee consisting of A. G. M. Robertson, C. W. Macfarlane and George Smithies was selected to draft rules and by-laws for the proposed association. The meeting then adjourned subject to the call of the chair. A. G. M. Robertson presided at the meeting.

There is talk among members of the Leilani boat club about the construction of a new boathouse, and the sentiment is strong against having a social hall in connection with the new building.

Supervisor Cummings is getting King street in good condition for the traffic that will pass over it June 11. Last year the Waikiki road had his attention about this time.
