Trotting and Pacing to Harness; 2:40 Class; mile heats, 3 in 5. Free for all.

Running Race; 1 mile dash. Free for all. Winner of Cup to beat record of Angie A (1:45 1/2); and receive \$50 extra.

## WANTED THE ARLINGTON.

Tommy Krouss Got an Unwelcome Boarder This Morning.

C. Sterling, the painter, had more trouble with that fiery steed of his to-day. Sterling went to his paint shop on Union street at noon to-day in his brake. He tied his animal outside and went in the shop. The animal was scared by something or other and bolted down the street. It turned from Hotel street into the the Arlington gate, dashed along the walk up the rear veranda, smashed through a lattice door with the brake dangling behind. The next impediment was the staircase leading upstairs. The animal cleared it, but couldn't take the brake with him. The vehicle was left behind. The horse continued his wild career and jumped the banistrade, emerging on King street, and was finally stopped at Kawaiaho church.

That part of the Arlington hotel through which Sterling's horse made the mad rush is a total wreck. The damage will amount to over fifty dollars, and Mr. Sterling will have to foot the bill. Jno. Lucas got the contract for repairing the damage.

This is the third time the same horse has done the runaway act within the past six weeks. The first time he did it Sterling was dumped out. The second runaway resulted in the injuries to Neiper, the expressman, and this one will cost the owner some dollars. Sterling is willing to sell the animal for anything. He has been advised to sell him to the Tramways Co.

## A BURNT CHINESE.

A Portuguese Boy Helps Him Out of a "Pilikia."

An elderly Chinaman escaped being burned to death through prompt assistance rendered by Joe Dias, a Portuguese boy. The Chinaman, who was walking down Lihua street about 11 o'clock this morning, had been smoking a pipe. After a while he put the pipe in his pocket. He trudged along down the street, and it was not until his pocket was ablaze that the man noticed something wrong. The embers from the pipe had caught the man's coating and caused the blaze. Being feeble and old the Chinaman was excited, and began crying. Dias who happened to witness the incident ran to his assistance and with no little trouble smothered the fire with his hands. Dias' hands were slightly scorched.

## Wishart's Sentence Suspended.

Ex-policeman Carl Wishart appeared before Judge Wilcox this morning to answer to a charge of "being present, countenancing and encouraging" in the assault by Geo. Nelson on Captain Cook of the mounted patrol. Wishart, who has been in prison even since his arrest stated to the court that he desired to change his plea of not guilty made yesterday and to now plead guilty as charged. The motion was granted.

On motion of the Deputy-Marshal sentence was suspended until moved on by the prosecution. Wishart will leave the country.
