The insertion of an item in the appropriation bill for an allowance to Kaiulani will meet the approval of the tax payers generally. The fact that the matter is advanced by the government will do much toward softening the political lines in Hawaii. After all that has been said and done regarding the monarchy there is really no prettier way of proving that the existing government has some consideration for one who was an innocent victim to circumstances. The bill should pass without alteration and it will, no doubt, unless the radical element in the Legislature is more hardened than we think.

If the aim of the government is directed toward annexation we fail to see wherein objection should be made to the report of the labor commission. That the planters have been roasted is a surprise because at least two of the members, one of them the chairman, are understood to favor anything the planters want, no matter who or what else may be affected. While annexation is the watchword renewed efforts should be made to populate the country with a more desirable class of citizens than we now have. The farmer is recognized as the mainstay of any country even though he may come out at the little end of the horn when the crop is taken off.

If there are thousands of acres of land here capable of producing staples it is only right that they be opened up to a class that will make the most of what there is.

A correspondent suggests that the Legislature should inquire into the general expenses of the government and particularly in to those of the prison, as well as the method of conducting that institution.

The anxious inquirer must consider that the members of the Legislature were elected under the most peculiar circumstances and so nearly do they resemble the government itself that they would fail to see the necessity for any investigation. The correspondent complains also that the expenses of the Oahu Jail are larger than when Captain Trippe was in charge. We can very well understand this because there are many more occupants of cells than during the Captain's time, and consequently there are more guards needed. In addition to this our correspondent must remember that there are a number of supporters of the government who must be given positions and a guards duties at the prison are not hard to perform.

If you want an investigation of the expenses and methods of the government, Mr. Correspondent you must wait until the constitution is amended before you can have your desires gratified.

Will Soon Leave on a Four Months' Vacation.

In conversation with an EVENING BULLETIN reporter this morning, Professor Berger stated that he hoped to get away on the next Australia for his four months' vacation. He will spend a week or two in San Francisco and New York before going to Germany. He expects to reach Berlin in two months from the time he leaves Honolulu. On arriving there he will report to his old regiment which is now stationed in that city, and will take part with it in the general celebration of the 25th anniversary of the Franco-Prussian war. This celebration will go on for months, but on the anniversaries of the great battles of the war extra rejoicings will be indulged in. The professor says that the great day of the celebration will be the 2d of September, the day on which the battle of Sedan was fought and won and on which the Emperor Napoleon surrendered.

During Professor Berger's absence the band will give concerts as usual under the joint direction of Messrs. Heitman and Naone. All Honolulu will join in wishing the genial band master a pleasant reunion with his old comrades in arms and a safe return to these isles.
