BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Armitage Case in Obeyance.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Health yesterday there were present W. O. Smith, president; Drs. Emerson, Howard, Day, Myers and Wood, T. F. Lansing, members, and C. B. Reynolds, executive officer, and Chas. Wilcox, secretary.

Dr. W. T. Monsarrat, meat inspector and agent under the act to mitigate made his regular report which was filed.

Agent Reynolds reported an arrangement he had made with Supt. Treadway of the Experimental Station for a salary of \$90 per month for himself and an allowance of \$20 per month for his son. The action of Mr. Reynolds was approved.

Application from Frederick K. Lewers, of Kansas City, Missouri, for permission to practice medicine here was read and filed.

Albert Sala of Kona, wrote regarding the natives drinking awa and the evil effects thereof.

Dr. Oliver asked regarding fuel for the bath houses at the settlement used by patients taking the Goto treatment.

The board ordered that tenders for supplies for the Insane Asylum and other institutions be called for.

The examining board reported 22 lepers at the experimental station who should be sent to the settlement.

Dr. Armitage of Wailuku sent a reply to the charges of petitioners to have him removed. He denied the charges one by one, and challenged proof of them. He accused C. B. Wells, manager of Wailuku Plantation, of having instigated the movement against him, saying he regarded it as a high compliment to have incurred, the enmity of that gentleman. The doctor's letter was characterized by a fine sarcasm that would win him fame as a journalist. Among other things about Wells, he remarked upon his coming out as the champion of the Hawaiians when they had not long ago made an attempt to cremate him.

As no proof was forthcoming from the petitioners, although such had been invited by the Board, the matter was left in abeyance. Matthew Noall, elder of the Mormon Church asked permission to visit the leper settlement twice a year in the interests of lepers in his faith who are confined there. He wished to make a visit with his wife and Elder Jansen of Salt Lake city in the near future. Elder Noall was notified that visits could only be made with representatives of other religious bodies when the board made its regular semi-annual visits.

Dr. Reginald Harold Reid of Detroit Michigan who made application through Dr. Day for permission to practice medicine on the islands will be notified that his application will be granted when it is received in writing.

At 4:25 the board went into executive session.
