ALL ALONG THE WHARVES.

FIVE ISLANDS STEAMERS COME IN THIS MORNING.

The Aloha, S. G. Wilder and Manuel Laguno to Sail Tomorrow -General Marine News.

SHIPPING NOTES.

Five island steamers came in this morning. The next steamer from San Francisco is the Mowwal.

The S G Wilder sails at 9 a m tomorrow with a full load of sugar.

The only vessel leaving today is the Klauca Hou for Hawaii at 4 p m.

The Lingham Line from Puget Sound to South Africa has secured the fine new steamer Oscar II as the next vessel to be dispatched.

The Aloha will take in 10,000 bags of sugar from the Hawaii and other island steamers, which will load her up to her ballast capacity. Captain Dabel will try to get away before tomorrow night.

The Glenol, British ship, at Fleetwood June 11th from Oregon, lost sails, 60 feet of bulwarks and also received other damage about the decks.

Captain Charles C. Tichworth has been appointed to the command of the tug Reliance and Captain John Silovich to the tug Vigilant of San Francisco.

The Chilean Government has at last seriously undertaken the work of lighting the Straits of Magellan, and have decided to attempt to erect a lighthouse on one of the small islands of the Evangelists. The delay in building has arisen from the difficulty of approaching the position of the site of the proposed lighthouse.

The Glasgow Herald states that Russell & Co., Port Glasgow, have contracted to build a steel sailing-ship of 1800 tons register for Messrs. Crawford and Rowat, Glasgow, to replace the Port Errol, which was destroyed by fire off Arran a few months ago. They have also contracted to build two 1300-ton sailing bark.

Passing Sandy Hook Lightship at 2:24 p m. on Saturday the 18th of May, the Cunard royal mail steamer Lucania, steaming south to as far as possible to avoid ice, arrived at Daunt's Rock at 6:40 a m Friday, May 24th, having covered a distance of 2897 knots in 5 days 11 hours and 40 minutes, or, at the highest rate of speed ever recorded for any steamer for five days' ocean steaming, of 22.1 knots per hour. The Lucania's days' run were: From 5:24 p m, Saturday, until Sunday noon, 431 knots, for the next 23 1/2 hours 505, followed by 524, 522, 517, and thence until 5:40 a m, Friday, 398.


